LONDON, Jan. 15—(Special)—Telegrams from Sweden say seventy thousand persons are suffering because of famine in Northern Sweden.

The crops have been a failure and also the fish catch.

An expenditure of six millions is needed to save them from decimation and the hardy northern cattle are in danger of being destroyed.

BUSINESS IN ALBERTA DESCRIBED

George W. West of Innisfail Talks With The Guardian

ISLANDERS LIVING THERE

Men Who Have Earned for Themselves Prominent Places in the North West.

THE Guardian had a very pleasant conversation yesterday with George W. West of Innisfail, Alberta N. W. T. who is at present on a three weeks visit to his old home in York, and friends in Centreville, Bedeque. Mr. West is a son of Martin West of this city and is one of the most successful Islanders in the prairie country where he has resided for the past twelve years. Mr. West is engaged in general merchandise and pork packing and has been for the past four years President of the Board of trade of Innisfail.

The town in which he resides is situated on a branch line of the C. P. R. running from Calgary to Edmonton a distance of about two hundred miles. Innisfail is fifty five miles north of Calgary. It combines the branching country around Calgary and the farming country around Edmonton; it is peculiarly adapted for mixed farming and ranching. Beef at three years old averages 850 to 900 lbs. dressed and exceptional ones reach 1400 lbs at four years old. During the last year the grain yield per acre averaged from 35 bushels to 100 bushels. The difference in yield is something in location and a great deal in the farmer himself. Innisfail is also a grand dairying country and the government creamery there, formerly in charge of J. R. Moore Pownall produces more butter than any single factory in Manitoba or the Northwest.

Mr. West denounces strongly the bringing in of the Gallicians and Doukhobore which he insists are far too poor a class for the magnificent country which has been given them. All the inhabitants without regard to politics, he says are indignant and unanimous in denouncing their settlement in the country. He describes the Gallicians especially as a dirty filthy class and far more objectionable than the people of the eastern provinces imagine.

Mr. West was eulogistic in praise of the officials of the C. P. R. whom he has always found most courteous from the highest in rank to the lowest. Asking in regard to the cost of living in Alberta the Guardian was told that the prices are little higher than in our own province. They range as follows best flour \$5.00 per barrel, beef \$5.50 per cwt, pork 7 1/2 mutton 10c., butter 20c. per pound and eggs 25 cents per dozen.

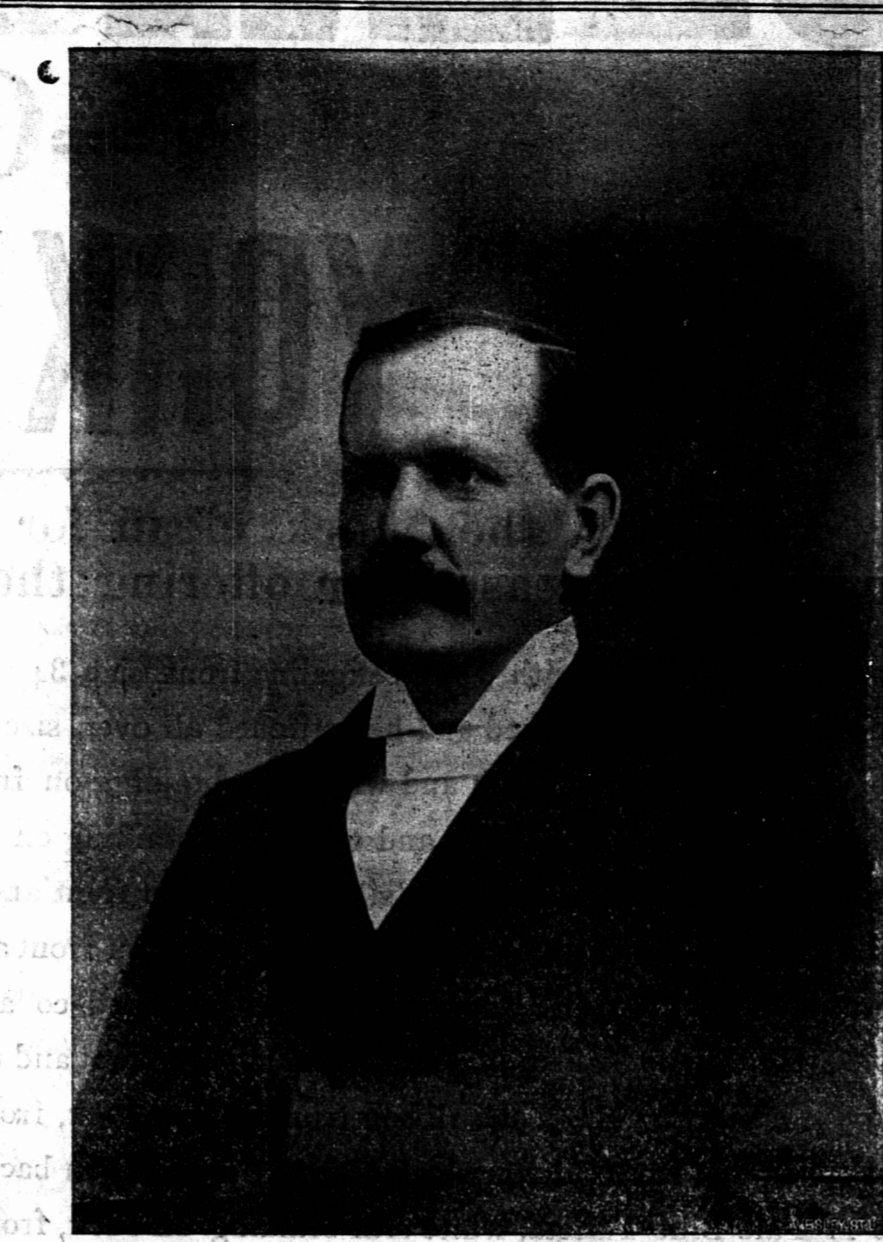
Speaking of the Islanders in Alberta the Guardian was pleased to learn that as in other parts of Canada they are among the most prominent men. Besides others there are J. R. Moore Pownall, formerly manager of the Creamery and now conducting a pork farm. Up till August Mr. Moore had cleared \$1000 on pork alone and the season was still unfinished.

James McLean, an uncle of A. A. McLean K. C. is engaged in mixed farming and raises some fine cattle. He began life there in 1891 and is to-day one of the most prosperous farmers. John West, Weleskiwia, a nephew of Martin West of Charlottetown carries on a large retail business. He has the largest store in Alberta conducted by one man alone.

C. B. McCallum from Centreville, Bedeque lives in Innisfail. He is agent for the Deering Harvester Co. and has a large ranch out 40 miles with 125 head of cattle and is going ahead rapidly.

Benj. Hooper of Milton is engaged in mixed farming and is getting on well. Isaac Saunders is in Calgary where he is engaged in the saddling business and is head of the company. He is a brother of A. C. Saunders of the Anglo American Telegraph Co.

Edward N. Harper formerly in the employ of W. W. Walker of this city is conducting a large jewelry business on his own account in Calgary.
