THE CZAR OF RUSSIA.

Nicholas II, Autocrat of all the Russias is 30 years of age. It is nearly ten years since he ascended the imperial throne. Today as a ruler of a vast empire, while yet in the prime of life, clothed with greater power and backed by a more numerous army than any other ruler on earth, he furnishes a striking example of the frailty of human greatness.

With a million of men under arms he cannot win a battle. With a navy which six months ago was counted second only to that of France and third among the great naval powers, his admirals cannot keep the sea. At home his ministers of state are struck down by assassins. He himself fears for his life unless surrounded by soldiers and police.

A recent article in the Quarterly Review, purporting to have been written by a Russian official of high rank represents the Czar as a feeble and superstitious ruler, intoxicated with a sense of his own power and mission, who disregards the advice of his ministers and holds him directly responsible for the Kishineff massacre, the war with Japan and the plundering of the Armenian church.

The picture is that of a weak, vacillating superstitious despot. This is in contrast with the previous general impression which held him well-intentioned but subject to the strong control of unscrupulous ministers. Whichever judgment we may accept, the personality of the Czar is not a pleasing one. And his present humiliation in the sight of the whole world is a thing almost unexampled in history.

The only fault with your remarks is that they were not half strong enough, and it is so long in the militia but a dozen or more other. It is now in a great measure a system of blackmail as the collector will threaten the merchant that unless he anticipates up he will suffer in lost trade from that particular section of the country. I know that such is the case as I have experienced it. So have others, Churches, halls, tea parties, charities of all kinds arrive day after day and make a systematic canvass of all stores and offices—thinking it is the only one where their name is leg on. Take a poll of the stores and offices, and see if the answer is not the same. I hope you can help to stop it, and you may ensure the sympathy of all will be with you. My experience covers nearly thirty years, and it gets worse every year.

CH'TOWN FARMERS' MARKET.

The assembly of farmers wives' and daughters at the market yesterday was the largest of this summer. Quite a large number of visiting tourists were noticeable among the throng, and the sights of butter, eggs and fruit, and the humming sounds of the sellers and the buyers must have proved an interesting attraction to them.

Raspberries, Blackberries, Logberries, and red, white and black currants were in plentiful supply and sold from 10 to 15 cents per quart. Some cherries were offering at 25 cents per quart.

Butter in rolls was picked up at 20 cts per lb. and eggs at 16 cts per dozen. Eggs for export (per case) are bringing 14 cts per dozen.

Outside. Very little produce was offering. Some loads of new hay were on the market and brought from 45 to 50 cts per 100 lbs. Old hay from 55 to 60 cts per 100 lbs.

Oats were very scarce, and for living stable consumption 40 cts per bushel was paid for good black.

White oats for export are bringing 34 cts per bushel.

Some new potatoes "Early Rose" were selling at 20 cts per peck.

Live hogs at the Dominion Packing yards at 44 cts per lb.
