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GREAT BRITAIN AIMS AT PARITY IN AIR

GERMANY HAS POWERFUL AERIAL WEAPON

Goering Warns Europe That The Reich Will Keep Pace With Neighbors.

BERLIN, May 2.—General Hermann Goering, Minister of Air, today warned Europe that Germany's air force "will always be as strong as any outside combination, for or against peace," and disclosed simultaneously that the Reich's military conscription would start Oct. 1.

Demand Apology

In the first flat statement of policy by any top-flight Nazi official since the League of Nations Council last month indicted Germany for rearming in violation of the Versailles Treaty, Goering said the Reich would not return to Geneva until the League apologizes for that action.

Earlier it became known Adolf Hitler, Fuehrer of the Reich and Goering's superior, was preparing an important announcement for the near future—probably to be delivered before an extraordinary session of the Reichstag—covering the following points:

1. Germany's rearmament.
2. Her international policy.
3. Germany's proposals concerning restoration of colonies lost to her in the Great War.
5. The Nazi Government's attitude toward the Versailles, Locarno, Rhineland zone and other existing or proposed pacts.

Surprisingly Frank

Goering, luncheon guest of the Foreign Press Association, said Germany's air strength lay in the superiority of men and materials. In an unassuming frank address, he mapped out the secret process by which the Reich, defying the Versailles Treaty, secretly rearmed in the air. He appeared in full uniform.

65 DEAD IN BATTLE IN MANILA

The following year he resigned the similar appointment to accept the chair of Economics and Sociology, endowed by the Carnegie Corporation, at St. Dunstan's University and Prince of Wales College. During his stay in Charlottetown Mr. Croteau has given several lectures to various local groups and has been a member of the faculty of the Agricultural Short Courses.

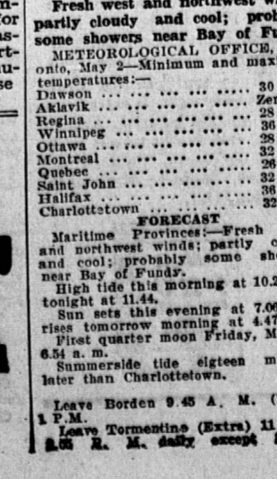
Veteran Physician Banqueted
