Senators Demand Same

An intimation has come from the Senate to the King Government that unless the resolution boosting by \$2,000 House of Commons indemnities is made applicable to the Red Chamber as well, it will be killed without delay or compunction in the Upper House.

Further in his article, Dr. Fulton describes the discoveries as to the composition of the blood which have been made during the pressure of the war years when blood plasma became so important, and so well known to the millions who gave their blood at the clinics.

This gave immunity from this disease to the fighting men. Albumin was similarly isolated and shipped to the ends of the earth.

Another of the gamma-globulins has proven highly effective in the prevention of infectious jaundice. Still another globulin routed out of its hiding place, is the one responsible for the specific blood type in individuals, that is whether one is type O, A, B, or AB.

Dr. Fulton, however, is especially pleased with the isolation from the blood of fibrinogen and thrombin, which are responsible for the coagulation of the blood.

Mixed one way they produce a dry foam which arrests bleeding so effectively that it "seems to be the answer to the surgeons prayer."

Another material produced from these two is "fibrin film," which looks like a sheet of latex.

There is a threat of a radio revolt in the United States which is worrying the broadcasting executives because it could become very serious for their business.

It seems that American soldiers overseas were getting better programs than the civilians at home. Before being shortwaved the broadcasts were decontaminated of commercial advertising.

The servicemen, suggests an exchange, may yet be able to confer a final boon on their country, one that will be particularly appreciated by the civilians who had to listen to first-hand accounts of gallant actions through the courtesy of somebody's product, the inference being that without that product such gallantry was impossible.

One of the most interesting reports yet on penicillin has come from the pen of Dr. John F. Fulton in the current issue of the Atlantic Monthly. Penicillin and the sulphas are credited with cutting front line hospital deaths from 15 per cent in the last war to three per cent in this.

Dr. Fulton points out that for years it had been known that some substances did attack infections in the blood stream, but unfortunately they put the white corpuscles out of commission at the same time, which was definitely not good.
