DEEPEST WELL IN THE WORLD

New York, Aug. 11.—To test the lower sands, which no well-drillers have ever reached, the Carnegie Steel Company will drill the deepest well in the world for natural gas at Pittsburg. It will be 6,000 feet deep, and is expected to prove whether or not there is a great gas sand lying under the surface of its gas territory. This will be more than 1,000 feet deeper than the deepest well now in existence. In order to drill it, a steel special derrick has been built just outside of the town of Waynesburg. If it proves successful, a number of others may be drilled. Government geologists are taking much interest in the undertaking and will watch its progress with care.


