THE TARIFF COMMISSION.

In a lengthy and well reasoned letter to The Patriot of Saturday last Mr. Warburton, K. C. urges our people to prepare for the coming of the Tariff Commission, which is expected to sit in Charlottetown before the end of the year. We can give our hearty endorsement to all the main points in Mr. Warburton's letter without departing from or coming in conflict with any previous utterance of The Guardian. We regard his letter as a timely contribution to the discussion of public affairs. During the hundred years that the people of Prince Edward Island had full control of their own fiscal affairs before confederation they framed the tariff for revenue only and they kept it extremely low. This basic fact illustrates our Island traditions in this matter and shows clearly what our statesmen in past generations held to be best for our welfare as a community.

With confederation other ideas came in, due to the great influence of the strong manufacturing interests growing up in Ontario and Quebec. The adoption of the so-called National Policy of protection in 1879 strengthened these interests and new and increased duties were from time to time added until Canada had become a country of high protection, which it has remained. So great had become the power and influence of the various protected interests that when the Liberal party succeeded to office in 1896, although its leaders were pledged to abolish the principle of protection and establish a tariff for revenue only, it was felt imprudent to attempt so much and but exceedingly moderate reductions were made in the general scale of duties. The British preference was, however, introduced, with provisions for its increase until this concession now amounts to one-third of the general tariff rate.

Now we have the manufacturing interests grown strong and rich and thoroughly organized, making a supreme effort to induce the Tariff Commissioners to recommend higher protection along many lines of factory products. This energetic effort finds expression in the public press, in the discussions and resolves of the Manufacturers' Association, in numerous deputations waiting upon the Government at Ottawa and in books and pamphlets advocating high protection and distributed broadcast in hundreds of thousands throughout the Dominion. Higher protection is not needed for our manufacturing industries; they were never before so prosperous. It is not needed to produce a larger revenue; the slight reduction in the tariff made by the present Government has resulted in a large increase of revenue. The forward movement and the supreme effort now being put forth by the manufacturers is conceived in a desire for larger gain on their part, gain which can only be obtained at the cost and detriment of our farmers, fishermen, lumbermen and the producing classes generally.

Especially do we conceive it to be against the interests of Prince Edward Island to have the tariff increased. We have few factories; our people are farmers, fishermen, merchants and professional men—all consumers rather than makers of manufactured goods. A low tariff such as we had in the days when the Island had full control of its own affairs would suit us best and be best for us if we could have it. The present tariff or any that

we are likely to have will be too high. It is clearly to our interest to join with the people of the far west in pressing these views upon the Tariff Commission. The fact that farmers and the consuming class are not organized or in a position to press their views as a body upon the powers that be, doubles the necessity to do what we can and make the strongest possible presentation of our case when the Commission shall meet. This is not now a political question. The tariff may be said to have ceased to be a political question since 1897 when Mr. Fielding formulated his fiscal policy. For that reason and because Island interests demand it, we speak plainly. Canada has already a tariff quite high enough for her factory interests and too high for her farmers and the laboring classes. Any change should be in the direction of lower duties.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Homestead Regulations

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 3 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 21 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry may be made personally at the local office for the district in which the land is situated, or if the homesteader desires to migrate, Winnipeg, or the local agent or receive authority for some one to make entry for him.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father for mother, if the father deceased of the homesteader resides upon the land, an application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent or receive authority for some one to make entry for him.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence on the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for notice.
