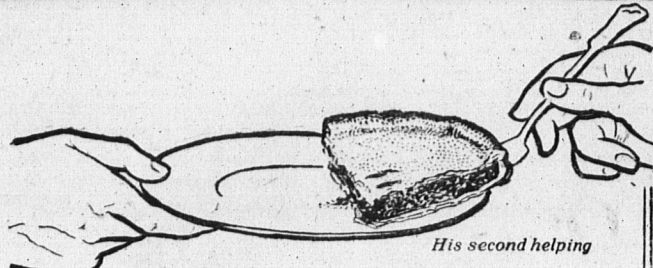
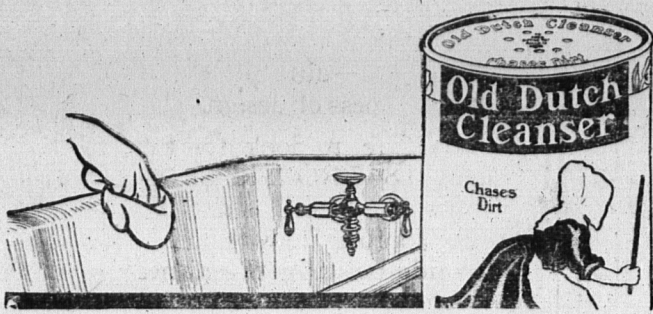

Deceased was 57 years of age and had never been ill in his life except for a somewhat similar shock which he suffered here two years ago. He leaves a widow and two children. He was an accomplished musician and a splendid singer being for some years choir leader of the leading Methodist church at his home town of London, Ont.
