IN MEMORIAM

MR. JAMES STEWART

In the passing of James Stewart whose death occurred at his home at an early hour Wednesday morning at the age of seventy six Charlottetown has lost one of its well known and highly respected citizens.

Of a pleasing personality and most agreeable disposition the late Mr. Stewart made many friends who will learn with regret of his demise.

For many years he was one of the partners of the well known grocery firm of Stewart & Gates and after the dissolution of partnership continued under the firm name of Stewart & Son.

He retired in 1914 and in 1922 was appointed as one of the three city assessors which office he held until last year when a change in the system was effected.

The late Mr. Stewart was in failing health for about a year and during the past two months was unable to leave his home where he received the best medical attention and most devoted care during his last illness. He was a faithful and devoted member of St. James Presbyterian Church holding the office of trustee for a number of years.
