ISLAND HERO RETURNS HOME.—Among the returned soldiers who arrived in the city Tuesday was Pte. Justin Kane, who registered at the Revere. It is regretted that owing to no notification being received here, of their coming they did not receive the reception that otherwise would have been given them. Pte. Kane whose home is in Morell enlisted three years ago with the 24th Batta. from Montreal. He has spent about twenty months in the trenches, and has been engaged in some of the heaviest battles. He was slightly wounded in the battle of Ypres, and at Vimy Ridge he received his second wound which was more serious. Since then he returned to the trenches, but finally he was granted a convalescent furlough. Pte. Kane looks none the worse of his experience, and is ready to go back whenever his call comes.

LITTLE GIRL INJURED BY BEAR.—NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—Blanche Zuzgi, who lives at 2,480 Belmont Avenue, the Bronx, went all alone yesterday afternoon to play in the Bronx Zoological Park. She was bouncing a rubber ball along the concrete walk outside of a bears den when the ball rolled under the railing and almost out of reach on the floor of the bears'

dining room. The little girl stooped down and reached out her hand after the ball, when the young black bear, which had been in the zoo only two weeks and didn't know any better, reached his paw through the iron bars and slapped Blanche on the head. He might have been playing, but the force of his caress half tore the child's scalp off. His claws became entangled in her hair and he swung her against the bars as he tried to pull away.

The child's screams brought a soldier, R. C. McDonald, a private stationed at City Park barracks, and a sailor, A. E. Price, running to the scene. McDonald grabbed the bear's paw and held it, while Price with a knife cut the child's hair clear from the animal's claws. In the meantime Miss Charlotte Frommer of 1,555 South Boulevard, came up and gave first aid to the child. An ambulance was called and she was taken to Fordham Hospital. Late last night it was said she was sleeping and would probably recover.

PUT BAN ON "CLOSE UP" DANCES

(New York Herald)

The Christian Endeavor Societies of Queens have put the ban on all modern dancing, more definitely expressed by Charles M. Debevoise, field secretary of the organization, who is responsible for the new rule, as "close up stuff." From now on the fox trot, grizzly bear, bunny hump, dreamy waltzes and others of that type will be tabooed by the Queens Christian Endeavors at all their parties. These dances, the young people decided, had a "deteriorating influence."

BOSTON BOY FIRST BLIND MAN PRIEST

BUFFALO, Nov. 22.—By special dispensation of Pope Benedict, Henry J. Westling, made blind by an explosion of chemicals in Canisius College here in 1910, is to be ordained to the priesthood, according to advices received here today by the college. This is the first known instance of a blind man entering the priesthood.

Mr. Westling is a graduate of Boston College and would have been ordained in 1914 but for the accident, which robbed him of his eyesight.
