MOSCOW CONFERENCE

Moscow, December 10 to Dec. 26, 1945. People: Foreign Ministers of U. S. A., G. B., and U. S. S. R. The conference is generally recognized as having been a very important one...

LONDON CONFERENCE

London, Sept. 11, 1945. People: Foreign Ministers of Britain, France, U. S. A., and U. S. S. R. None of the problems that the Foreign Ministers of the "Big Five" United Nations met to consider was settled...

DOMINION-PROVINCIAL CONFERENCE

Ottawa, August 1946. People: Representatives of the Dominion Government and the Premiers of the provinces. The number of documents prepared under the direction of the Cabinet Committee on Dominion-Provincial Relations was estimated to be 100...

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, millions of self-respecting people who were our allies in the war-devastated lands of the world are struggling for survival against hunger and disease...

WHEREAS, the 1,500,000 of these destitute people who benefited through the first National Clothing Collection are only a very small fraction of those in need...

WHEREAS, the meeting of this urgent need overseas will serve not only to relieve suffering humanity, but will aid liberated peoples to revive their economic life...

WHEREAS, the Prime Minister of Canada, the Premiers of all the provinces, the religious leaders of all faiths and other public men and women have said that the need is imperative and justifies a second appeal to the Canadian people...

WHEREAS, the second National Clothing Collection is an effort to meet the foregoing emergency...

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Reuel Lepage, Acting Mayor of Charlottetown, urge all religious, educational, patriotic, civic, fraternal, business and labour groups to co-operate in this collection of clothing, shoes and bedding for overseas relief...

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of City to be affixed on this 18th day of June 1946.

POTSDAM CONFERENCE

Willen Scholem, Germany, July 17 to August 2, 1945. People: President Truman of the U. S. A.; Premier Stalin of the U. S. S. R.; Premier Attlee of Great Britain; the Foreign Secretaries of their three Governments...

ACT OF CHAPULTEPEC

Place: Mexico City, Mexico, Feb. 24-March 3, 1946. People: All the American nations except Canada and Argentina.

SAN FRANCISCO CONFERENCE

San Francisco, April 25-June 26, 1945. People: Delegates of 50 invited nations in addition to those of the sponsoring nations United States, Great Britain, and China. Later, the Ukraine, White Russia, Poland and Argentina were added to the total represented 50 nations.

Result: At the final session the Conference approved three documents: 1. The Charter of the United Nations. 2. The Declaration on the Atomic Bomb. 3. The Declaration on the Prevention of Atomic War.

CONFERENCE OF UNITED NATIONS FOOD AND AGRICULTURE ORGANIZATION (F.A.O.)

Place: Quebec City, Canada. Date: 1945. People: Delegates of 36 nations. The delegates agreed on a program for achieving the goal of eliminating hunger and want from the world.

CHARACTERISTICS OF REPTILES
