did not practice the economy they preached. It was currently rumored about the streets of Charlottetown that goods purchased from the wholesalers were being carted about the streets of Charlottetown. Recently the foolish statement had been made that because of the fire which destroyed the hospital building during the Macmillan administration that for part of the time there was "no Falconwood". Any man who made such a statement should be locked up in the institution. Mr. Macdonald declared amid enthusiastic applause.

Comparing the record of the present Liberal administration with the Macmillan Government the speaker pointed out that almost 7,000,000 less to operate under Conservative rule than it did for the three years under the present Liberal regime.

One of the "leaks" in Falconwood had been gasoline. According to current report gasoline sent to the island for the three months they were in office they spent a lot of the roads but their efforts were confined to main highways to the neglect of secondary roads which were not nearly so good as they were when the Macmillan Government was in power.

Less Attention To Health
In public health the Liberals did less than the preceding Conservative Government, spending \$63,208 as compared with \$64,302 under the Macmillan regime.

Another "Arbitrary Act"
One of the strong points brought out by Mr. Macdonald was that under a revised statute, another of the Liberal arbitrary acts, if a small farm included property to go through probate in just the same way and at just the same cost as an estate of \$80,000. It would cost more to probate a small farm, and if there was no personal property the money would be taken from the estate of the deceased.

Improper Expenditures
Holding out of the Province's money, without a proper check for \$100 lots to such people as "the Belgian Count" was roundly denounced by the speaker. It was improper way for anyone to handle the public money. There should have been a proper account. The Liberal Government was making a great deal about collecting the few dollars dog tax and the same time was freely spending it on such "special prohibition investigations."

Side Tracked Speech
This year Mr. Hughes remained in Charlottetown during the Easter holiday to prepare a speech on the budget, a speech which Mr. Macdonald said he understood was not going to be favorable to the Government. But the speech was never made. Perhaps because an election was "in the air."

Mr. Samuel Kennedy agreed with his colleague that the present Liberal administration was "hard up against it financially" and that that was the reason for calling the election at this season of the year.

Dealing with the promise of the Liberals in 1935 to "balance the budget annually" Mr. Kennedy de-

Referring to the administration of the Prohibition Act Mr. Kennedy pointed out that last year there were 36,000 scripts issued and averaging the cost of liquors at three dollars per unit that would make a gross sale of \$108,000. But the accounts showed gross sales to be \$210,000. Where did this \$100,000 additional revenue from liquor sales come from, Mr. Kennedy asked.
