Fabulous Marine Monsters

(By Dominion News Service)

LONDON, June 26.—It is reported from Singapore that some mysterious unseen monster has caused the death of a man named Van Breda while bathing on the South coast of Java, the tragedy sending a shock through the British colony. Van Breda was bathing when he was suddenly seized by some unseen creature, and only dragged out with difficulty. He had been so shockingly injured that he died a few minutes later. In this article "A Retired Sea Captain" deals with the interesting subject of Marine Monsters.

When I was a boy I remember a very old book containing a woodcut of a giant devil-fish attacking a brig. The tentacles of the horrid monster were dragging down the ship, while as a side-line the sailors were picking them off the men and carrying them to the loathsome creature. Ugh! But—

How far does fact fit in with fancy, in these imaginative pictures and stories of Monsters of the Deep?—from giant squids, stinging rays, enormous man-eating congers, and the elusive sea serpent?

A scientific examination of large marine creatures proves that exaggeration has had full play. The sea-serpent now due to artists' fancy, has been identified with the octopus, snake, a sinuous marine curiosity that attains a length of some thirty feet—a gentle creature with no more spirit than a glow-worm.

The squid belongs to the cuttlefish order of marine creatures and is popularly known as the "devil fish" because of its tenacles. It has lent itself to many picturesque stories by ancient mariners while the ancient writers classed it among the fabulous creatures. Occasionally of the gigantic size, especially on the coast of Jersey and Guernsey, a fact used with telling effect by Victor Hugo in his "Tollers of the Deep."

The octopus is the true "devil fish"—a fish that may well be classed as a sinister menace to everything that gets in its way. One of the largest specimens recently seen was washed aboard the Cunard liner "Carmania" while voyaging across the Atlantic. After a struggle of fifteen minutes it was beaten to death with an iron bar, and was found to measure five feet across the body with tentacles ten feet in length.

Stories of the dreaded octopus dragging people down to the solid depths rest upon a pretty solid foundation. I have known personally a sailor who while searching for clams among the rocks of a South Pacific island suddenly found a grasp upon his ankle. Gazing down he was horrified to see a devilish face staring at him from the water, and fastened round his arm. After a severe struggle he managed to hack himself free with his clasp knife.

Another man, fishing from a boat in Delagoa Bay felt himself suddenly gripped by the waist by the slippery tentacles of this horrible creature of the deep. Though he grasped the sides of the boat while a companion fired into the water at the octopus, the hapless man was dragged down to his doom.

The squid is a first cousin of the "devil fish" and in some parts of the world is feared as a very dangerous. Although armed with tentacles to which suckers are attached, its chief offensive—and very unusual—weapon is its ability to eject a sudden stream of inky fluid at any object it attacks. Primarily this was probably used to darken the water to facilitate escape from even larger monsters that preyed upon it, but the fluid is highly dangerous.

The sea-serpent has been dealt with. Probably giant congers have in old days been confused with the length-attainers and very numerous congers. A conger twelve feet long was captured off the coast of Cornwall and while being hauled in snapped a man's leg like a carrot.

The giant ray is another fearsome marine creature that in stance grows to great bulk. It has the peculiar power of inflicting a "sting"—in reality an electrical shock when irritated, just as certain jelly-fish stings. The "bathor Casca" on record of rays seizing a bather and literally drowning the unfortunate person.

Monsters of the Deep! Science is gradually showing us that most of the old legends of marine monsters rest on a rather poor foundation of fact.

Great Britain's Unhappy Year

(By Dominion News Service) LONDON, June 26.—10 divorces a day. 879 marriages a day. 3,235 babies a day.

These figures are revealed in the Registrar General's statistical review of England and Wales for 1922, which adds that the birth-rate last year, 22.4 per 1,000, was the lowest since 1837—the year of Queen Victoria's accession to the throne—except for the war years 1915-1919.

The boys born in England in 1921 were 5 per cent, more than the girls.

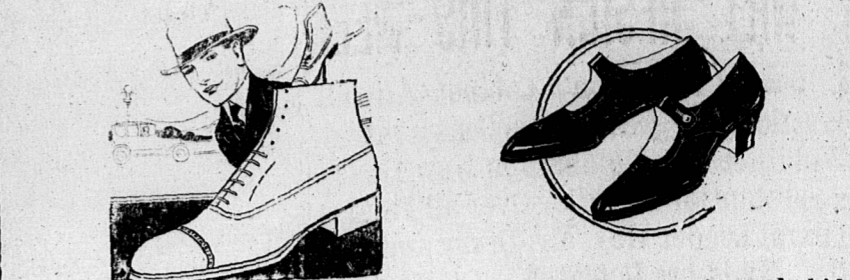
The divorce figure—3,458 dissolutions of marriage and sixty four annulments—is the highest on record. The marriages numbered 320,352, fewer by 59,130 than in the previous year, which was a record year.

Most men married at the age of twenty-nine and girls at the age of twenty-one.
