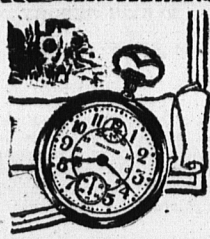

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any issue over sixteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.
Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within a mile of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt sections along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.
Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after entry; homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.
A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre.
Duties—Six months residence in each of three years; cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$200. If a tract of cultivation is subject to reforestation in case of rough, scrubby or stony land, Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

REGULATIONS

under

"THE MOTOR VEHICLE LAW"

of

the Province of Prince Edward Island and the Act in Amendment thereof, approved by the Lieutenant Governor, in Council on the 28th day of April A. D. 1917.

1. The "Provincial Secretary" mentioned in "The Motor Vehicle Law" and the regulations thereunder shall mean the Provincial Secretary of this Province or the Assistant Provincial Secretary thereof.

"Marker" mentioned in these regulations shall mean the plate or card upon which is displayed the registered number assigned to each motor vehicle.

The word "Dealer" mentioned in these regulations shall mean any person engaged in the sale of motor vehicles keeping the same in stock for sale, or a person acting as sales agent for motor vehicles having a warehouse where the same are stored and offered for sale.

MARKERS AND LAMPS TO BE PROPERLY DISPLAYED.

2. The registration number and the letters "P. E. I." shall be painted on the plates or markers for motor vehicles in a distinct and contrasting colour, such markers shall be kept clean and free from dust or mud and displayed on the front and back of the vehicle in the case of automobiles and on the back with respect to motorcycles, so as to be easily distinguished. Such plates or markers shall be so attached to the car as not to be easily removable and so as not to swing when the car is in motion and must never be attached to the axle of the car but to the body of the same. The bottom of each plate shall be horizontal and at such height from the ground as may be determined by the Provincial Secretary or his representative, but in no case shall it be less than eighteen inches from the ground. The rear marker shall be so placed that it may not at any time be hidden by the trunk rack or otherwise and during the period when the vehicle is required to display lights the said rear marker shall be illuminated so as to be plainly visible at a distance of sixty feet.

FEES FOR MARKER.

For each set of plates or markers a fee of one dollar shall be paid by the person obtaining same.

VEHICLE TO BE PROVIDED WITH LOCK AND KEY.

3. Every motor vehicle shall be provided with a lock, key or other device to prevent such vehicle from being set in motion, and no person shall allow any such vehicle operated by him to stand or remain unattended in any street, avenue, road, alley, highway, park, parkway or other public place without first locking or making fast the vehicle as above provided.

REGISTRATION NUMBER AND LAMPS MUST BE DISPLAYED.

4. No person shall operate or allow to be operated any motor vehicle without having attached thereto its proper registration number, or without being provided with its regulation lamps, or being provided with such not properly displaying the same.

OFFICIAL MARKER ONLY TO BE USED.

5. No registration number or marker other than that supplied by the Provincial Secretary, shall be used or displayed upon any motor vehicle.

PENALTY FOR NONPAYMENT OF FEE OR TAX.

6. A penalty of two dollars per day for every day the registration fee or annual tax remains unpaid shall be imposed on any person operating or causing to be operated a motor vehicle upon which the said registration fee or annual tax has not been paid.

MARKERS TO BE REMOVED WHEN CAR SOLD OR EXCHANGED.

7. Any person who sells, exchanges or otherwise disposes of a motor vehicle belonging to him shall, before delivery thereof, remove the number plates or markers issued to him by the Provincial Secretary, and attached thereto at the time of such sale, exchange or disposal, and if he neglects to do so and delivers to the new owner the said number plates he shall be guilty of an offence and liable for

PENALTY.

the penalty imposed by "The Motor Vehicle Law" and regulations thereunder and shall forthwith be held jointly and severally liable with the new owner for any loss or damage caused by the new owner with such vehicle so sold, exchanged or disposed of.

SURRENDERED NUMBERS MAY AGAIN BE ASSIGNED TO ORIGINAL OWNERS.

8. The Provincial Secretary may assign to any person who so surrenders his registration certificate and who desires to register another motor vehicle the distinguishing number or marker so surrendered.

MARKERS USED ANNUALLY, OLD ONES SURRENDERED.

9. New markers with numbers thereon are to be issued annually. On procuring new markers the old markers shall be surrendered to the Provincial Secretary.

TAX PAYABLE MAY 1st.

10. The tax on motor vehicles shall be paid on the 1st day of May in each year. Motor vehicles registered after the 1st day of August in any licensed year shall be required to pay the whole amount of registration fee and one half of the annual tax only.

HALF ANNUAL TAX PAYABLE IF CAR REGISTERED AFTER AUGUST 1st.

If the annual tax on a motor vehicle already registered is paid on the date upon which it becomes due the registration number allotted to that motor vehicle may again be allotted to such vehicle.

IF TAX PAID ON 1st MAY ORIGINAL NUMBER MAY BE AGAIN ASSIGNED ORIGINAL OWNER.

If not so paid on that date the said original number may be allotted to any other vehicle by whomsoever owned.

UNREASONABLE NOISE WITH HORN AND BELL PROHIBITED.

11. No bell, horn or other device for signalling shall be used, except as a warning of danger, nor shall be sounded in such a way as to make a harsh objectionable or unreasonable noise, except in the case of fire and police department vehicles and ambulances.

PENALTY FOR TAMPERING WITH CAR.

12. Any person using, interfering or tampering with any motor vehicle without the permission of the owner, besides being liable for all damages caused, shall upon conviction be liable to a fine of not less than five dollars or imprisonment for not more than thirty days or both. This shall not apply to any official or other person employed by the Government for the enforcement of "The Motor Vehicle Law" and regulations thereunder, nor to those acting under instructions of such officials or persons in their official capacity.

CARS PROHIBITED CERTAIN HOURS ON SUNDAYS.

13. No person shall operate a motor vehicle on the public highways or on the streets of any city, town, or village, in this Province on Sundays between the hours of 9 o'clock a. m. and 1 o'clock p. m. and between the hours of 6 o'clock p. m. and 9 o'clock p. m.

CARS PROHIBITED WITHIN 300 YARDS OF CHURCH ON SUNDAYS.

14. Save and except in the City of Charlottetown and Towns, no motor vehicle shall be operated within three hundred yards of any church or place of worship on Sundays during the time the congregation therein is engaged in worship. This shall not apply to Clergymen or to Physicians in performance of professional duties.

PENALTY FOR OPERATING CAR UNDER INFLUENCE OF LIQUOR.

15. If any person under the influence of intoxicating liquor convicted under the said Law be not the holder of an operator's or chauffeur's license he shall be condemned to imprisonment in the common goal for such period of time not exceeding six months as the Court may determine without the option of a fine. If he be the holder of an operator's or chauffeur's license he shall be liable to a fine of one hundred dollars or in the discretion of the Court to imprisonment in the common goal for such period of time not exceeding six months as the Court may determine and upon such condemnation the license shall become null and void.

MEETING TEAMS, ETC.

16. A person operating a motor vehicle beyond the limits of the city, towns and villages in this Province, shall on meeting a person riding, leading or driving a horse or horses or other draft animals, bring such motor vehicle

RENCH CAPTURED 30,000 PRISONERS SINCE MIDDLE OF APRIL

GREAT HEADQUARTERS OF THE FRENCH ARMY IN FRANCE.—The Germans today desperately stormed the positions captured by the French to the south of Berry-Au-Bac, but they made no impression. What was left of the strong attacking waves was forced to retire, leaving behind many dead and 120 prisoners in the hands of the French.

Further batches of prisoners fell into the French net at other points as a result of various raids, bringing the total of unaccounted Germans taken prisoner to between 29,000 and 30,000 since April 16. A German wireless message, dated May 2 declares:

"The total number of Germans unaccounted for in the battles between April 8 and 20, including dead and wounded left on the field and prisoners, reached 7,500."

CANON SIMPSON'S PROTEST

Sir.—Under this heading, appears a letter in the Guardian of May 10th instant, in which Canon Simpson condemns in very strong language the holding of bridge and dance in the Prince of Wales College Hall on the evening of the 15th instant, for the purpose of raising funds for the Belgian Relief Fund, and calling on His Honor, the Lieutenant-Governor to refuse to lend his name to such a cause.

While the Canon has won the respect of the public for his efforts and the efforts of his sons in this great world conflict, and while in most matters he is known to hold moderate views, yet in this particular case, his action is certainly ill advised in trying to injure an object entirely praiseworthy in itself, and especially in publicly dictating to His Honor as to what cause he should lend his name. Surely this can be left to His Honor's good judgment.

The Canon's reasons for condemning the holding of a bridge and dance to raise money for the Belgian Relief Fund do not seem to justify his outburst. If bridge playing and dancing are in themselves dangerous and immoral pastimes, then the Canon should have publicly condemned the practice long ago. Unless they are in themselves harmful, there does not seem to be any more serious objection against them at this time than at any other time. The reason given, namely, "dancing on the new made graves in France" is certainly far fetched. The same objection can be raised at any time in the world's history. The present time is only one of dread. Death stalks in our midst. All that tread the globe are but a handful to the tribes that slumber in its bosom. We never could dance without doing so on the graves of our dear departed in as strict a sense as we now do on the "new made graves in France." Yet we have not heard, that the Canon previously tried to influence those outside of his congregation in regard to these pastimes.

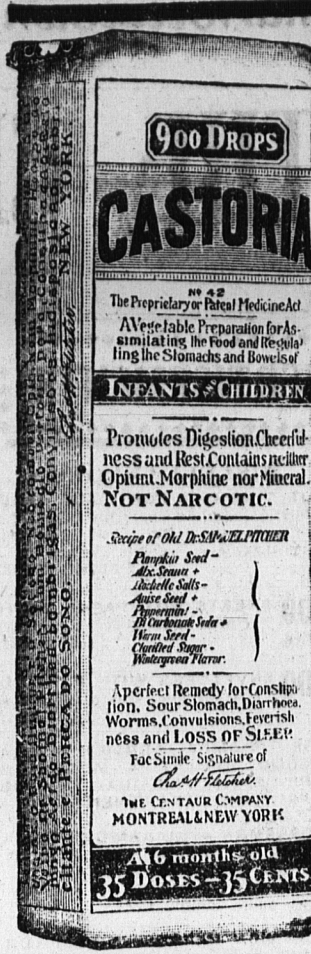
