LAI D TO REST.—The funeral of the late Mr. William Grant, Charlottetown, took place yesterday morning from the residence of his son, Mr. Richard Grant, Water St., to Saint Dunstan's Cathedral, where a Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Father Peter Duffy. From the church the funeral proceeded to the Railway Station, from where the body was conveyed by special train to Vernon River. The funeral service in Vernon River Church was conducted by Father P. D. McGuigan, who also conducted the service at the grave. There was a large attendance of citizens at the funeral. The pallbearers were: Messrs. Henry Aitken, Henry Lowe, James Eden, D. O'M. Reddin, Charles Lyons and T. B. Riley.

COURT OF APPEAL.—The Court of Appeal in Equity was in session yesterday and on Thursday hearing the appeal of Andrew Stewart, Liquidator of Dominion Trust Company, from the decision handed down on the 19th March, 1915, by Mr. Justice Fitzgerald, Vice-Chancellor in the suit brought by Bradford LePage and others against Dominion Trust Company. Application was made by the Liquidator for an injunction to stop the suit on the ground that it had been brought without the leave of the Supreme Court of British Columbia which has charge of the winding up of the Company having been first obtained as is required by the Winding-up Court. The Vice-Chancellor dismissed the application and from his judgment this appeal was taken. The presiding judges on the appeal yesterday were The Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Haszard. Mr. Neil McQuarrie and Mr. Aeneas A. Macdonald, K. C., represented the appellant and Mr. G. Gaudet and Mr. J. J. Johnston, K. C.'s represented the respondents, all four counsel being heard on the argument. Judgment was reserved.

Dr. Optimism and Miss Confidence bring Dollar into the port of trade and business activity is restored.

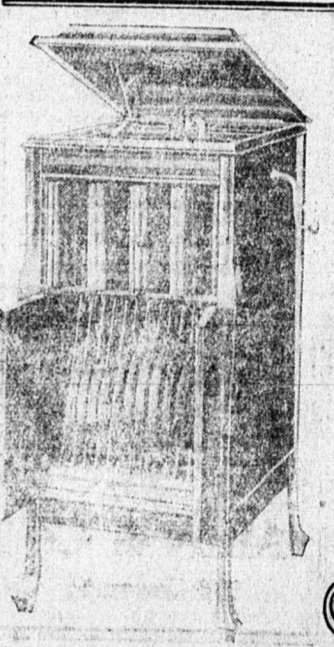
