BERLIN, April 7.—Prussia and Germany will soon have but one Government, Minister for Economic Affairs Kurt Schmidt declared today. The two cabinets will be fused into one, he stated. After reviewing the "political and economic" progress of recent months, which he attributed to the "energetic and intelligent" leadership of Chancellor Adolf Hitler, he spoke of the plans for consolidating Prussia and the Third Reich, saying: "It will be the first attempt ever made to unite in a single body the executive of Prussia and the Reich."

TAKE BRISK WALKS TO SHAKE SPRING FEVER. A daily walk is one sure cure for spring fever. When you feel that need of sulphur and molasses coming on, get into low heeled walking shoes and step out for a hike through the park. If you can't arrange a schedule that will give you a half hour for a morning walk, plan to take one late in the afternoon. It's important that you enjoy this bit of healthful, fashionable exercise. Smile as you stride along and see how quickly old Mr. Spring Fever drops out of sight. Don't saunter — brisk steps are what counts for beauty. Maintain a good posture, chest up, stomach in, arms swinging free, feet pointed straight ahead with your weight on the outside edges. Yes, it's imperative that you keep your weight on the outside of the feet. If you put it on the inside, you'll tire too quickly and the walk will not be fun at all. How far to walk? Well, try three quarters of a mile the first few days. That's about enough if you aren't accustomed to it. After a week increase the distance to a full mile and later, as the fad begins to take a firm hold on you (and it will), it's likely that you'll think nothing of hiking three miles each day. FOOT TROUBLE MAY PUT STRAIN ON MUSCLES. In an endeavor to avoid aggravating a blister, corn or some other foot trouble, the patient usually develops other symptoms. He gets pains in the legs and ankles, and is usually convinced that the trouble is spreading to these parts. Actually they are caused by the fact that the patient is putting too great a strain on unaccustomed muscles. When the foot condition clears up and walking is natural, these odd pains disappear. Treatment, therefore, should always be directed towards getting the original trouble put right. Corns on the soles of the feet or on the toes, either the hard or soft variety, corns or other skin trouble, bunions and enlarged toe joints, gout or rheumatism — these are some of the causes.
