CHICAGO, Dec. 22.—The last of the scheduled hearings in the Government's suit to dissolve the International Harvester Company as a combination in restraint of trade was held here today. At its conclusion the Government attorneys went into conference to check up the results of the hearings in various cities and to decide upon further action. It is possible that an additional hearing may be held soon in New York. Hearings on behalf of the International Harvester Company may be demanded by the Harvester Company's attorneys, it was said.

HELD UP WITH GLASS PISTOL.
