TORONTO CIVIC ELECTION.

Toronto elected its mayor, aldermen, board of control, and other civic officials on New Year's day, and at the same time the electors voted on a number of by-laws. One of these by-laws was in favor of furnishing the city with power for electric lighting, and the operation of street railways and factories from Niagara Falls free from company control. This was rejected by a vote of 10,286 to 2,905 and thus strongly endorsed the power scheme of the Ontario Government. The vote was the more remarkable from the tremendous corporate influence of the wealthy electric companies arrayed against the by-law.

Another significant feature of the civic election was the large vote polled by the Socialist candidate for Mayor. Mayor Costarworth was re-elected by a vote of 13,068 to 8,286 in favor of the Socialist candidate who in this case happened to be one Lindala, an Italian tailor, whom few of the English population seemed to know anything about, and who had never taken any part in civic affairs before. This large Socialist vote in a leading Canadian city is the subject for serious comments by the Toronto press, and may well be considered by the people of Canada at large as the evidence of a growing element that must be reckoned with in the future.

We get a glimpse in the Toronto News of the platform on which the Italian Socialist Lindala was able to secure over 8,000 votes toward making him Mayor of Toronto. Before the election The News said of this platform:

"It denounces editors, college professors, and preaches as 'intellectual parasites,' commissioned to mislead the people and to create a public opinion favorable to capitalism, and explains the aim of the Socialist is to abolish 'wage slavery' and to establish the collective ownership of lands and machinery. In effect it is designed to abolish private property and to reduce all men to a dead level of uniformity. It is an impossible program and as mischievous as it is impossible. . . . It means class war, confusion, anarchy."

The Socialist vote in Toronto is the more significant because a movement to like ends has obtained a considerable foothold in Winnipeg, Vancouver and Victoria and along the Pacific coast. It is an old-world product so far as its origin is concerned, but has established itself in American cities and its doctrines appeal with special aptitude to restless and discontented spirits among the working classes everywhere. However regrettable we may think it, the forces of organized discontent are yearly becoming stronger in America as well as in Europe.

St. John has established what is called an Every Day Club, the motto of which will be "To help men to be men." The club room will be supplied with games, reading tables, newspapers and magazines. Of some fifty or more leading business and professional men asked to contribute a small sum to establish this club, we are told that not more than one or two declined. The Every Day Club has Elton A. M. Belding at its head for chairman of the executive, associated with whom are a number of merchants, and professional men. The object is an excellent one. There is room for an Every Day Club on similar broad lines in every city and town in Canada.

Souris and Montserrat may deservedly feel proud that Number Three Company of the Fourth Regiment excelled all others in Canada in the competition of last year. Canada is a big country and has many fine artillerymen, but according to the official test the most efficient men behind the guns are to be found in this Island, and the best in the Island are to be found at Montserrat and Souris. All honor to the eastern gunners!
