# THE OVERTURN IN NEW BRUNSWICK.

THURSDAY MORNING, MARCH 5, 1908.

At this distance the sweeping overturn in New Brunswick comes as a surprise to most persons and to many as a surprise and a regret. We have become accustomed to Governments being sustained at the polls and so striking an exception is unusual. Most persons here had anticipated that the Robinson Government would be sustained, with possibly some diminution of its hitherto large majority. The result as told in our despatch of yesterday morning is its complete overthrow, giving the Opposition almost if not quite two thirds of the new House of Assembly.

The Government which met defeat on Tuesday may be said to have held power for twenty-five years from 1883. The late Hon. A. G. Blair was its leader for thirteen years to 1896, and he was succeeded as Premier in turn by Hon. Messrs Mitchell, Emmerson, Tweedie, Pugsley and Robinson. It had carried six successive elections. At first it was a composite of Liberal and Conservative elements with Liberal principles in the ascendant. It gradually became more Liberal and at the election just now held appealed for support as a purely Liberal Government and was heartily supported on that ground by Hon. Messrs Pugsley, Emmerson, King, Gillmor and other members of the federal Government and Parliament who took a very active part in the campaign.

Still it was mainly on local issues that the Robinson Government went to defeat—on questions of an unpopular road act, the price of school books, the provincial finances, the guaranteeing of railway bonds, the increase of the provincial debt and a too lavish expenditure generally. Premier Robinson, who is a clever and reputable public man, had been but a few months in office and his fall was due rather to his predecessors than to any fault of his own. But he made mistakes, one of which was the selection of an inexperienced and unfit Provincial Secretary, and another, the promulgation of a sensational audit of the public accounts by an expert accountant from Toronto, published on the very eve of the election, unsigned and obviously incomplete. This action was more calculated to arouse suspicion than to give assurance that all was right.

There were other contributory causes to the defeat. The outgoing Government had been too long in power; it had lost its leading men of by-gone days, by death and removal to other spheres; it had lost the support of the St. John Telegraph which powerful organ had supported it in all previous contests, but now conducted a vigorous campaign against it, while The Globe refused to actively fight its battles. Moreover the introduction of the secret ballot for the first time in Provincial elections, was counted upon by the Opposition, whether rightly or wrongly, as a factor of some consequence in deciding the fortunes of the day. The same was true of the movement in many counties to restrain the use of money and liquor, as in the use of these nefarious agencies the party in power has always a manifest advantage.

As to the significance of the provincial overturn in regard to federal politics, it would be perhaps a mistake to suppose that it will be very great. To Hon. Mr. Pugsley the result in St. John, where he was a few months ago returned by acclamation, the adverse majority of 500 votes will now be unwelcome and will overshadow a stiff contest when some months hence he must return for re-election, but experience has proved that provincial elections afford little indication of how federal

elections may turn out. As for the general result, when the heat of the party strife has abated the sober second thought will probably be that after twenty-five years the change was not untimely, perhaps not undesirable. It is well to have a political house-clearing and a new accounting once in a while. And Mr. Hazen, shortly to be Premier is to those who know him best, an able, clean and honorable public man, in whose hands for a time at least, the control of the Province may safely be trusted.

### INDEPENDENCE.

The esteemed Pioneer rises to remark that "The Guardian's error lies in the assumption that the whole party press and all party politicians lack that very essential quality independence." Well, let us see. The Pioneer in common with the Liberal party press of a dozen years ago were crying out against the too lavish expenditure and the volume of taxation imposed by the Government of that day. Today with an expenditure twice as great and forty millions more levied in taxes yearly they are silent. Why? For no reason based on principle, for no other reason in fact than because the expenditure is made and the taxes levied and collected by a Liberal instead of a Conservative Government. Then the Liberal press were calling out for reform of the Senate and their leaders promised it when they came into power. No attempt has been made at Senate reform except to give the Senators 25,500 a year where they had \$1,000 before. But the party press seem nothing wrong, nothing inconsistent in these things. Is there any great vestige of independence in such a course?

If there were a little honest independence in the party press it would seek to check the abuses within its party and to reform the party from within. We look in vain for any such effort. Jobbery, corruption, ballot-switching, rake-offs in contracts, all the forms of maladministration are ignored, glossed over or defended outright by the party press supporting the party in power, whatever that party may happen to be. It is the same, has been the same under both parties. Notoriously all these forms of evil have been practised, are being practised and are condoned or defended by the party press. Is there any independence in such a
