On Saturday afternoon at the Charlottetown Tennis Grounds the second of a series of Tournaments was played between Summerside and Charlottetown. Charlottetown's long standing bid for more strenuous provincial competition has been very effectively called this season by Summerside. The interest in the game in the western metropolis has been greatly increased by the extensive improvements made on their grounds and the addition of an extra court.

The tournaments as arranged between these clubs this summer is bound to have the desired effect, that of developing players who will hold their ground in Maritime events.

The initial meet of the present season was played in Summerside on June 3rd inst., when out of twenty-seven events, Summerside players captured 14. On Saturday last at Charlottetown, the tables were turned somewhat, Charlottetown winning ten of sixteen events.

The premier players of the afternoon was Mr. W. McDonald, of Summerside, who in men's singles, defeated the best that Charlottetown could array against him. Other strong Summerside players were Misses Sinclair, McArthur and Linkletter, and Messrs. D. O. Stewart and Rev. St. C. Jeans. One of the best matches was played between D. O. Stewart, Summerside, and Lloyd Jenkins, Charlottetown, won by the latter 12-10. Misses Sinclair and McArthur, Summerside, who won over Misses M. Stewart and I. Bourke.

Meeting Of S' Side Central Guardian Town Council

An adjourned meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held last night with Mayor Lidstone in the chair and Councillors Schurman, Grady, Phillips and Kelly present. Mr. Messervy, city engineer of Charlottetown, was present and gave some valuable advice to the council and answered all questions put to him very satisfactorily. Mr. Messervy was in Summerside all day looking into the work of paving Central Street. A resolution was passed to lay a permanent concrete street on Central street from Water street as far north as the council sees fit and that the work be proceeded with at once. Further resolved that all owners of property on that part of the street which is to be paved be assessed one eighth of the actual cost of such work. A resolution was also passed to appoint Mr. Messervy at \$5 per day plus hotel and travelling expenses as engineer for the work of paving the streets. The finance committee were instructed to purchase any material necessary for the paving of Central St. A communication from the water and sewerage commissioners regarding the services of one of their men in connection with the work of the streets was laid over until the next meeting. A resolution was passed to purchase a flag for the town building at a cost of \$6.85. The size of the flag to be 3 1/2 by 7 1/2 feet. A complaint was made by Councillor Schurman in reference to dirt being left in heaps by the side of the road after it was swept up, and also about the lack of parking space for cars. He said this matter had been brought to his attention by certain citizens. Coun. Phillips, in reply, stated that everything possible was being done to keep the streets clean. A suggestion from Coun. Kelly that a street cleaner with push cart and broom be employed every day to keep the streets clean. The matter was left to the street committee to look into. Mr. Phillips also stated that the matter of marking water St. for the parking of cars was receiving the attention of the street committee. The police are to be instructed to prosecute any person found speeding at fires, or interfering in any way with the fire department in the execution of their duty. Speeding within the town limits was referred to by Councillor Phillips. A stop sign was ordered to be put at the corner of Central street and Fitzroy streets, to do away with the honking of cars at that corner as complaints had been made by the Prince County Hospital of the nuisance. The work of laying improved piping in preparation for the new concrete street will be recommended on Thursday and Mr. Messervy will commence his work in connection with the street paving on Saturday.—S.

"We have dealt with the Provinces," the Premier repeated, "in a generous way. We have given large increases of subsidies to these Provincial Governments. We have left no grievances of any kind, with the Provinces and the Dominion were never more satisfactory in the history of Canada than they are on the eve of this election."

Discussing the tariffs, the Premier said: "In this country as it is today we cannot have either a high tariff policy or a free trade policy. We have got to have a moderate policy that will reconcile the interests of the different parts of Canada."

The Prime Minister denied that the Dunning budget was a "precipitate" one, declaring that it simply put into effect what the Government had been planning, and what he personally had been saying, over a year ago.

His attitude had been that trade was peaceful exchange of commodities, while the Conservative attitude, he contended, was that trade was war.

In conclusion the Premier stressed the importance of the forthcoming Imperial conferences and challenged Hon. R. B. Bennett to say whom he was going to send to those conferences and who the members of his Cabinet would be if his party is elected. Premier King, if re-elected, would send Hon. Ernest Lapointe and Hon. Col. Ralston to the Empire Conference and Hon. Chas. Dunning and Hon. Mr. Malcolm to the Economic Conference.

The British preference clauses in the budget, he concluded, meant that Canada was at "the leading of the ways—the ways that lead to the heart of Empire, the ways that will help to make British trade what we want to see British trade made." The Liberal party proposed to go to the Empire Conference with its hand outstretched in good faith; Mr. Bennett on the other hand proposed to go with a club in his hand.

HON. CYRUS J. MACMILLAN

Had Brilliant Career As Educationist

Dr. CYRUS J. Macmillan, of McGill University, whose appointment as Minister of Fisheries in the Mackenzie King Government has been announced, had a distinguished academic career. He was born in Wood Islands, Prince Edward Island, son of the late Hector C. Macmillan and his wife, Isabel Fraser, and received his early education in the one-room school at Wood Islands. From there he matriculated into Prince of Wales College. He graduated with an honor diploma and the Vice-Chancellor's Medal for English awarded by the late Judge Fitzgerald of the Supreme Court. After his graduation Dr. Macmillan entered the second year in Arts in McGill University, graduating with honors in English and History. On his return to Prince Edward Island he was appointed teacher of English in Prince of Wales College holding that position for three or four years.

In 1903 he was awarded his Master of Arts degree by McGill. He subsequently took a three years' course in the Graduate School of Harvard University where he held in succeeding years a University Scholarship and Townsend Fellowship and Thayer Fellowship. He completed his course in 1909. At the end of the first year in Harvard he received his M. A. degree and in 1909 his Ph. D. degree from that institution.

In 1910 he was brought back to McGill from Harvard as lecturer in English, soon after being promoted to the assistant professorship.

Late in the autumn of 1915 he was given leave of absence to enlist with the rank of lieutenant for overseas service. He helped to organize the 7th Canadian Siege Battery known as the McGill Battery, consisting largely of McGill students and graduates. In 1916 he went overseas as captain of the Battery. In the autumn of 1917 during the Passchendaele operations he was transferred to the 6th Battery—a Saint John battery—as commanding officer, with which he remained throughout the remainder of the war. He took his battery with him to the Rhine, that battery being one of the four heavy batteries which went up with the Canadian corps.

Major Macmillan was twice mentioned in despatches for his work as liaison officer at Hill 70 and for gallant and distinguished conduct.

After the war he returned to Canada in 1919 and in the autumn of that year resumed his academic duties at McGill University as associate professor of English. On the sudden death of Professor Laflair in Egypt in 1925 Dr. Macmillan was appointed Moulton Professor of English, Languages and Literature and head of the department of English, one of the largest in McGill University with registrations in its various courses of between 1700 and 1800 students each year in addition to a large number of business men and women and others who take specially prepared extension courses. Dr. Macmillan was chairman of the university committee on extension courses since the latter was organized eight years ago and in that capacity had lectured in various parts of Canada.

He received his degree of Doctor of Philosophy on writing a thesis on "Folk Songs of Canada and Their Relation to Those of Europe." He published "Canadian Wonder Tales" parts of which have been translated

into several languages. "Canadian Fairy Tales," "Tales of the Woodmen Told" the latter in serial form. A number of his articles dealing with Canada appear in the "Child's Book of Knowledge" and in "The Children's Encyclopedia."

In 1920 on the occasion of the celebration of the 100th anniversary of McGill, Dr. Macmillan at the request of a London publisher wrote a history of the institution. It appeared under the title of "McGill and Its Story." It is a complete history of the university and of the early struggle for education in Canada. He has also contributed articles to various magazines and journals Canadian, American and English on literature and economic subjects in relation to the Maritime Provinces.

In 1926 Dr. Macmillan was appointed a member of the Royal Commission on Maritime Claims known as the Duncan Commission under the chairmanship of Sir Andrew Rae Duncan. In 1928 he was selected as a member of the Royal Commission on the Atlantic Fisheries. In 1929 he was appointed by the Prince Edward Island government as chairman of the Royal Commission on Education in Prince Edward Island his appointment as chairman being previously approved of by the Teachers' Federation.

In his student days Dr. Macmillan was outstanding as an athlete. He held the Maritime championships for three years in the quarter mile run. He was also a member of the McGill track team and frequently of the Harvard team.

Political Experience

During the election campaigns of 1919 and 1923 in Prince Edward Island Dr. Macmillan spoke at various meetings on behalf of the Liberal candidates in his native district of Eilat. During the federal election in 1921 he also took the stump for Hon. Herbert Marler at present Minister to Tokio. Dr. Macmillan also campaigned in the interests of Hon. Walter Mitchell in the St. Antoine division. The first Liberal elected there for thirty years. He also took part in the general election in 1925 speaking for Liberal candidates in Montreal.
