For five days they wandered about, suffering greatly from the intense cold. Mr. Hughes who was the least affected by the cold at length heard the bark of dogs while wandering around and soon came upon some Indians who cared for them and had them taken to their destination. One of the last to reach had his arms and hands frozen, another was blinded by the smoke while endeavoring to warm himself at a small fire and he afterwards went insane from the exposure to the intense cold.
