Lou Campbell Holds Westerners to Three Scattered Hits and no Runs. Team Behind Him Plays Air-Tight Ball. Locals Now Leading Two Games to One in the Race for Championship.

Before the largest crowd of customers that has so far attended a ball game this season, the Madisons turned Summerside back last evening in the third game for the Island Championship without a tally, beating them to the tune of 9 to 0.

Although the game was somewhat one-sided in runs the excitement was none the less intense; the fans being on their best behavior, giving the "happy hand" to each and every player when snappy plays were recorded.

Nonwithstanding the airtight support behind him, Lou Campbell, the Madison hurler, has not by any means lost any of his old-time cunning, for he not only held the "Westerners" to three lone hits against nine, but shut them out without a count.

The first and second inning was uneventful, both teams playing snappy ball without a count being registered, but the break came in the third, when the Madisons dropped on Howatt, and with the help of his outfield kept the scorers busy until the eighth when a nine to nothing count loomed big on the score-board.

Campbell, in turn, by no means had an easy time of it, for in the fourth session it looked as though Summerside was going into the run column—with two men on and two down, Perrin hit a liner to deep centre, and a double count looked inevitable, but Purcell, who is playing a great game in the outfield this year, hauled in out of the hole by making a great stab and retiring the side.

The Madisons were playing championship ball, and nothing happened but the above mentioned result. Joseph McCullough umpired the game with satisfaction, while Jack McAleer called them equally as well on the bases.

All Steel Trains Standard Equipment of C. N. Railways

NATIONAL LINES ADDING NEW CARS OF MOST MODERN TYPE TO ALL REGIONS

All steel equipment will in future be the standard of the Canadian National Railway's heavy main line passenger trains. There has been some all steel baggage cars and coaches on certain trains in the past, but with the delivery of the thirty all-steel baggage cars and forty one all steel first class coaches, ordered for this year, assignment has been made to have hereafter a uniform all-steel train on the principal runs.

To maintain the all steel standard, a large number of cars is required. Some trains like the "Continental Limited" for example are made up of eighteen coaches. Others are from fourteen to sixteen.

The new coaches and baggage cars are being distributed over the three regions of the System, Atlantic, Central and Western and will be in service on the "Ocean Limited" and "Maritime Express", "Montreal-Halifax", "International Limited", "Montreal-Chicago", "Continental Limited", Montreal-Vancouver, "The National", Toronto-Winnipeg and other main line trains, thus offering the best service to all parts of the country.

Keep Your Shoes Neat

After the forming and ripening of the seed has begun to draw up on the stored-up resources of the grass or clover body, its value as forage gradually decreases. It is therefore obvious that in order to obtain hay yields holding the largest percentage of prime feeding substance, cutting should take place right at the blossoming time or in the case of grasses such as timothy, as soon thereafter as it is practicable.
