The funeral of the late John McLean, took place from North River yesterday to Highfield Cemetery, and was largely attended.

The death took place at Souris River, May 24, of Johanna Cahill, relict of the late John O'Donnell, aged 68 years, leaving one son and one daughter.

Mrs. W. Green was called suddenly to Charlottetown on account of the illness of her little son, Reggie, who was there with his father.—St. John Telegraph.

The S.S. City of Ghent arrived in port yesterday from Halifax and intermediate ports, with a general cargo. She will discharge today and sail with return cargo.

A young man named Edward Ryan who had been assisting in unloading salt from the S. S. Karnak, had the misfortune on Saturday to have his leg broken in two places when transferring the bags of salt to a schooner alongside. He was taken to the Charlottetown Hospital and made as comfortable as the circumstances would allow. He will probably be laid up for four or five weeks.

An illustration of the damage caused by the ice to the property of fishermen, and the consequent loss resulting was afforded yesterday at Hillsboro Bridge. Caught on the pier of the bridge whither the incoming tide had drifted them were remnants of herring nets, in which were enmeshed numbers of herring. The fish had evidently been caught for some days as they were somewhat decayed.

Three of the officers of the S. S. Karnak have enclosed to the Guardian the following letter, which is a pleasure to publish: "Allow us through the medium of your paper to thank the residents of your City for the kind and hearty welcome accorded several officers of the Karnak now discharging in the harbor. We were at the drill hall on Thursday evening and were surprised at the efficient and soldierly manner in which everything was done; the 4th is a credit to the province, their officers, themselves, the Empire. The Karnak is a splendidly found large freighter owned in Liverpool, Eng., and came into port last week laden with salt. She is now lying at Pownall wharf, and because of her size is attracting much attention from citizens, who do not often have an opportunity of seeing such a big ship at close quarters. She will leave tomorrow.

A large concourse of neighbors and friends assembled at Marshfield yesterday afternoon to accompany the body of the late D. Blair McBeth to the grave. 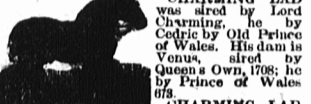
