FLOUR PRICES SOAR AT OTTAWA

OTTAWA, Jan. 23.—Flour reached its highest altitude here Saturday when its price soared to 10.10 a barrel, an increase of 20 cents since the last rise in the latter part of December. There is every prospect of a still further increase which may effect the price of bread. Local bakers are still standing by their old prices though any further increase may cause them to reciprocate with an advance in the price of bread. There has been an increase of 60 cents a barrel in the price of flour within the past six weeks.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

The sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitation house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

P. E. Island Man Dies in South America

ST JOHN, Jan. 23.—News has been received of the deaths from yellow fever of four Canadians while on a mining prospecting tour of South America. Thomas Morrison, son of John J. Morrison, of Georgetown, P.E.I., was one of the victims of the deadly scourge, and the rest were British Columbians.

Morrison left home eight years ago and settled in Prince Rupert as one of the pioneers of that new town. Three years ago he moved to Vancouver and prospered in the real estate development there. When the real estate boom collapsed in that city he and some of his friends fitted up an expedition for South America, where they heard of a promising mining venture in Southern Chili. They were obliged to put into the port of Colombo to have their vessel repaired and while there the yellow fever broke out. Morrison and most of his company contracted the disease, he and three of his companions succumbing.

Morrison was quite prominent in Vancouver in athletic circles along the coast. He represented the Vancouver Athletic Club in various meets for several years. Besides his parents he leaves five brothers, Malachi of Morin, Wyoming; Felix of Little Pond, P.E.I.; George of Prince Rupert; John D. and Andrew of Georgetown, and three sisters, Margaret and Sarah of Boston and Mary of Georgetown.

DOINGS OF WOMEN

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—Forty-five American women control over a billion dollars. Nearly every State has its rich women who are prominent locally, and whose influence has a large bearing in many ways. Chief among the women who hold the reins upon money is Mrs. Mary Harriman. It took the late railroad magnate, Edward H. Harriman, just 99 words to transfer his entire estate to his widow, without the slightest restriction. Mrs. John Jacob Astor received a huge estate but it was saddled with condition that she should not wed again. Mrs. Russell Sage was also given the custody of her millions without a string. Mrs. Hetty Green, known as the richest of them all, has added distinction of having amassed most of her wealth. To be sure, she had four or five millions to begin with, but she has made this amount grow to many millions—just how many one can only guess.

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 20.—Miss Geneva Moeser, 21 years old, has been appointed Auditor of St. Clair County. Winning the office over nine male candidates. The girl has been acting as assistant to her father, who died a few weeks ago. So well has she done her work that the Board of Supervisors advanced her into her father's place, with a salary of \$2,200 a year.

MONTREAL, Jan. 20.—Miss Joy Whitehead, a Montreal girl, known as a crack rifle shot, and an all-around athlete, is a prisoner in Bulgaria, according to advices received by her parents. She is the daughter of Charles Whitehead, a cotton mill manager. When taken prisoner, she was acting as a lieutenant in the veterinary corps of the Serbian army, having given up hospital work so that she might get closer to the firing line. Miss Whitehead missed connections with the ill-fated Lusitania, and sailed on the next boat. She was sent from England to Serbia. In November she received a veterinary commission from the Serbian government, and since then all trace of her was lost, until word came from a Bulgarian hospital that Miss Whitehead was a prisoner.

DULUTH, Jan. 20.—From Duluth to Berlin is a long way, particularly in war time, but Berlin is never far away when an opera singer gets a bid to come. Miss Alice Sjoselins, Duluth's noted young soprano, has sailed for Europe, with the German capital as her destination, and she

has an engagement to join the court opera for an indefinite period. CHICAGO, Jan. 20.—The opinion of Miss Ida Tarbell, the writer and investigator, to the effect that mill girls make better wives than the average high school and college graduate, has aroused no end of discussion. Miss Tarbell based her contention on the conditions she found during her trip to the mill cities of the East. She worked with the girls in the mills and lived as one of them. She knows the school and college-bred women of the country, and her startling opinion has brought her into high favor with the working girls and into a clash with the college women. Miss Tarbell lays the blame for her companion onto the love for dress and outward appearance which the college women display, while the working girls get the experience on the serious side of life.

PRINCE EDWARD THEATRE

In spite of strong counter attractions last evening the Prince Edward Theatre was crowded to the doors, "The Diamond from the Sky," being the irresistible drawing card. Charlottetown theatre goers are following this absorbing serial with the keenest interest, and each number is more enthralling than the preceding one. "The Prodigal's Progress," the instalment shown last night was crammed with exciting situations, and the adventures of the diamond makes a very entertaining picture. Arthur and Blair Stanley meet in Richmond, after the trying experience of the former in the automobile chase, and at the Charity Ball one of the belles wears the diamond, which has been pawned by Arthur. The Gypsy, who goes to the dance in the guise of a fortune teller steals the jewel from the lady's neck the picture closing at this interesting juncture. "The Hazards of Helen," instalment was perhaps the most exciting of the series thus far shown. "A Mile a Minute" being another demonstration of this clever artist's agility and fine acting. At one time she leaps from one car to another while they are in motion, jumping across a space of some 20 feet. "Driven by Fate" was a fine three-reel comedy drama with a happy ending in which the old man is reconciled with his wayward son and gives his formal consent to the marriage between the boy and his sweetheart. 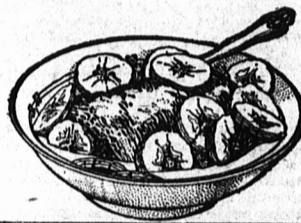
