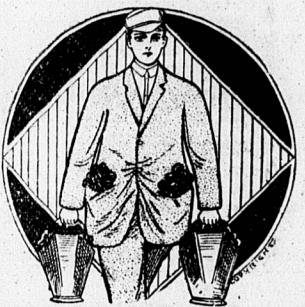

ITALY REAFFIRMS TURKISH ATROCITIES. ROME, February, 26.--The Italian Foreign office to-day published a memorandum, accompanied by photographs, detailing terrible atrocities committed by Turks and Arabs on Italian soldiers. The Italian Government announces that it feels incumbent upon it to denounce to neutral governments the systematic profanations, devoid of all human feeling, who, it says, are a stain upon the Turkish army. Proof is also offered that Turks and Arabs fired upon ambulances, constantly using dum-dum bullets.
