WAR UPON CONSUMPTION.

Within the past few years a great deal of information has been circulated through the press in regard to tuberculosis, its wide prevalence, its great fatality, the means of which it is spread and the best means of prevention and cure. No person who has any interest in such matters and who reads can claim to be ignorant in regard to these matters, but there is a great deal of indifference in the public mind respecting the subject, especially among those who may not have lost near relatives by the dread disease.

The public mind requires to be impressed as well as instructed in regard to this matter. If like cholera, the plague or smallpox in the olden time, consumption were sweeping its thousands to death in a single city within a week, the public mind would become alarmed and alert in the matter of preventive measures. But consumption does not thus do its work. Its myriad victims are selected here and there; they know not when they are stricken; they linger for months or years slowly wasting away; there is no sweeping epidemic, and yet in the aggregate their number is more than all the hosts that fall by plague or pestilence.

While we write there are said to be 30,000 to 40,000 persons in Canada suffering from

consumption,—hundreds of them in our own Island. Everyone of these is a radiating centre for the spread of the disease to those who are nearest and dearest. For hundreds of years this was not known; now the fact that consumption is thus spread is declared on the highest authority. And we are told that one in every eight who die in the Dominion are hurried to the grave by tuberculosis and one of every two who die between the ages of twenty-five and thirty-five! Just when life is best, most prized by the possessor and most valuable to the community, consumption cuts it down.

These facts should stir the community to action along the line of prevention and cure. They show the value of the work being done in the creation of sanatoria for the care and cure of those afflicted with the disease, and of the educational campaign being conducted by the Canadian Association for the prevention of Tuberculosis. As is mentioned in another column, an effort is being made to form a provincial branch of this Association here, and the Local Council of Women have called a meeting for Tuesday evening next in the Market Hall for this purpose at which His Honor the Lieutenant Governor will preside. We trust it may prove abundantly successful.

The people of Norway having separated from Sweden were called to choose what form of government they would adopt. An active body favored the creation of a republic. The test of popular feeling was made at a plebiscite on November 13 when 233,935 voted in favor of Prince Charles of Denmark being made king of Norway, and 62,739 against him. The republicans had counted upon obtaining 33 per cent of the vote polled, but received only 21 per cent.

A great religious gathering is now going on in Carnegie Hall, New York, in which are assembled hundreds of delegates representing 24 Protestant bodies with an aggregate membership of 18,000,000. It is known as the Interchurch Conference on Federation. Organic union is not aimed at, but it is hoped to establish closer and better relations between various denominations and to make it possible to voice the attitude of united Christian churches on great religious moral and social questions in a way that has been hitherto impossible.

IMPORTANT LETTER TO TEACHERS.

To The Teachers of The Eastern Inspectorate!

I am desirous of having Reading Circles and Local Institutes of Teachers established throughout my inspectorate, and for that purpose I would ask the teachers to assemble in the school houses at the following centres on Saturday December 2nd at 1 o'clock p. m.— Kingsboro, Souris East, Little River, Bridge, Lower Cardigan, Georgetown, Montague, Sturgeon, Murray River, Peake's Station, St. Peter's Bay, Mount Mary, Mount Stewart, St. Margaret's, Donaldson, Priest Pond, and Webster's Corner. Each teacher should go to the centre which is nearest his district.

The following constitution and bye-laws would, I think, be appropriate for such institutes to adopt.

CONSTITUTION.

1. This association shall be known as the Teacher's Institute and Reading Circle.
2. The object of the Association shall be the mutual improvement of its members in literary and professional life.
3. The officers of the association shall be a president, a vice-president, a secretary treasurer, and a corresponding secretary. These officers together with three others to be chosen, shall constitute the executive committee and the term of office of all shall be one year.
4. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to make programs, determine time and place of all meetings, and to do whatever else may be necessary for the successful working of the Association.
5. Any amendments to this Constitution and by-laws may be made by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any meeting, provided notice of such amendment be given at a previous meeting.

BY-LAWS.

1. The annual membership fee of the Association shall be—, to be paid to the Secretary-Treasurer.
2. The usual rules of associations shall govern this Association.
3. All members agree by signing this constitution and by-laws to contribute to the success of the Association by performing the parts assigned to them; to attend all meetings possible; to promote the cause of professional study of education to the best of their ability.
4. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to send accounts of the proceedings of all meetings to the newspapers for insertion.

To keep education before the public is to cause them to value it. The public seeing that the teachers are determined to improve will hold both them and their work in higher regard. In connection with those associations much use should be made of my Free Lending Library for teachers. 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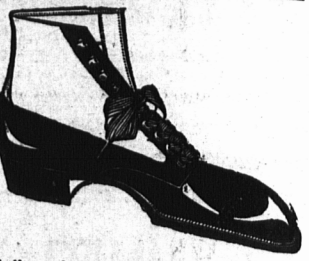
