Harry and Mrs. Humphries, who are known as the Kelsey Kids of New York City, are the guests of Mr. Sterns at the Queen Hotel, City. They arrived last evening on the Northumberland and in their khaki attire and wide brimmed hats attracted no little attention at the dock, at the hotel and around the town through which they later took a short walk. Mr. and Mrs. Humphries are on a tramping tour of the world which they expect to complete in three years and nine months time, having already traversed three thousand and ninety-four miles in three months.

They are taking up a wager of \$10,000 offered by the Polo Monthly Magazine to Mrs. Humphries and the conditions of the wager are that every foot of the land must be traversed by foot. No official record is kept of their travels but they collect certificates from the Mayors of cities, transportation companies and hotels of their presence and a part of the contract is to obtain the signature of every nation's ruler to a Flag of Peace which has already been signed by President Taft and Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Their travels have been worthy of exceptional interest. They left New York on July 22nd, going to Montreal by way of Albany, Buffalo, Niagara Falls and Toronto, arriving on Sept. 10th. They then proceeded to Newfoundland where, at St. John's, they secured the great seal of Archbishop Howley, a treasure they prize highly. Travelling 550 miles through Labrador they returned to Sydney, thence to Pictou and this city, coming the guests of the Charlottetown Steam Navigation Company, to whom they feel grateful for the many courtesies extended.

They will remain in this city today and Mr. Humphries will prepare an article on the town for the Polo Monthly, he and Mrs. Humphries appearing at the Peoples Theatre tonight, where Mr. Humphries will deliver a lecture on their travels and previous experiences. The latter is an Englishman by birth, 29 years of age and slight yet muscular build, and has lost fifteen pounds since leaving New York. He went through the Boer war and the China Boxer uprising and in 1898 he won a thousand pounds, a diamond ring and a medal for a 450 mile run between Johannesburg and Kimberley the time being 48 hours. When at the Guardian office last night he exhibited the medal and ring which were presented to him by the late Paul Kruger. He also won a twenty-five mile run on 4th July last in New York, his time being two hours and twenty-eight minutes. Mrs. Humphries was formerly of Halifax, is twenty-seven years of age and has lost thirteen pounds since July 22nd. She established a record by walking 2,500 miles in two months between New York and Florida, which is the record for any woman in the states. SHANGHAI, Oct. 19—(By Wire)—Six packed steamers have arrived from Hankow carrying refugees. The refugees declare that the whole Yang Tze Valley from Hankow to Shanghai is in the hands of the rebels with the possible exception of one or two of the largest cities to which private officials have retired with the available troops.

Copies of the Central China Post arrived on the Belgavia. An editorial article comments on the manner in which the revolution was conducted. "The movement demands the admiration of all parties," says the editorial, "but the massacre of the Manchus in our three cities is a ghastly blot on the reputation of the revolution."

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 19—(By Wire)—That the revolution in China, whether successful or not is liable to involve other powers of the world in conflict, the proposed treaties, notwithstanding, is the opinion of Rear Admiral R. D. Evans.

BERLIN, Oct. 19—(By Wire)—A reliable correspondent of the Zeitung Am Mittag, where he escaped the Italian censorship, says that the station losses in nightly skirmishes in Tripoli are considerable, and that the stations ascertain that the Turks and Arabs are discouraged but their intentions to surrender are pure humbug.

BERLIN, October, 18—Chancellor Von Bethmann Hollweg appeared in the reichstag today and reiterated the statements set forth in his letter to the speaker yesterday explaining the inability of the government to discuss foreign affairs at the present time. He assured the house that it would be fully informed of the progress of current events before it was prorogued. This was in reply to interpellations concerning the Moroccan situation, the occupation of Tripoli by Italy and the Chinese revolution. For the moment the government, he said, could not participate in a discussion of these matters without endangering German interests.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 18—The Turkish fleet left the Bosphorus under orders to protect certain sea-ports and should occasion arise to engage the Italian ships. Italy's proceedings in the Aegean sea are intended to force Turkey to accept the loss of Tripoli and to enter into negotiations for peace.

LONDON, October 17—A dispatch to the Chronicle from Constantinople says:—"The Italians are reported to have suffered a serious reverse outside Tripoli. Reconnoitering, they advanced too far from their base and came in contact with the Turks, who gave battle, and forced the Italians to retreat hurriedly. They left 100 dead on the field."

Rome, via frontier, October, 17—The reports received by the government from General Caney commander of the Italian army expedition in Tripoli, show that his attention has been directed chiefly to making the City of Tripoli an impregnable base from which will be provided reinforcements and supplies necessary for the campaign in the interior.

Fortifications are being extended all about the city, making it a thoroughly entrenched camp. Posts will be established along the line of the advance into the country in order to make it impossible for the enemy to cut off the invading column from its base of supplies. News from the interior reaching the Italian commander through friendly natives "describes an active campaign among the Arabs to incite them against the Italians are miserably presented and the occupation of Tripoli they declared to be an infamous blot on the pages of history. Thus it was sought to start a holy war against the invaders, the Turks are also said to hold out the promise of rich booty when the invaders are driven into the sea.

The American figures show that only a quarter of a million settlers went from Canada during the ten years.
