Leo Coyle's Restaurant, situated about one-half mile east of Summerside on the main highway, formally opened for business on Saturday. This modern eating place which is such an important addition to the entertainment facilities of the town, stands as a monument to its designer and builder, the late Leo Coyle, who met a tragic death in an automobile accident almost one year ago today while on a hurried business trip to Moncton, N.B., in connection with this restaurant.

The late Mr. Coyle was a native of this province who, after having made a success in the United States, returned to the Island a few years ago to enter the restaurant business. Having imagination and vision he planned this new restaurant and banquet hall which would be something outstanding in its line and an important tourist attraction for the town and province. He died before it was completed. It was finished and is operated by his son, Mr. Charles Coyle, a war veteran, who came here from Boston on his father's death. He is assisted and advised by his mother, Mrs. Leo Coyle, who operates the Olympia Restaurant in town, and his wife and his sister, Miss Bette Coyle.

It is a two-story building 77 feet by 48 feet and the exterior is finished with white asphalt shingles. One enters immediately into the restaurant section which is a large room 65 by 28 feet and will seat 108 people. The walls are finished in knotty pine and the ceiling is covered with acoustic board. The lighting is very effective with an indirect cove lighting arrangement along the walls and built-in

fluorescent fixtures in the centre. The floor is covered with mahogany red asphalt tile in diamond pattern. In the centre block in the floor are the words, "Leo Coyle's." On the left of the entrance is the fountain in horseshoe design, finished with Morocco red leather with white leather trim. A souvenir counter, the cash desk and the office are also at that end of the room.

On the right, are booths around the walls with tables in the centre. Adjacent to the restaurant is the convention and banquet hall, a room 65 by 24 feet. This room is also finished with knotty pine, Donnacona ceiling and indirect cove lighting. At one end is a stage for an orchestra or entertainers and a men's and women's cloak room. The banquet tables can be stored under the stage so the whole floor can be cleared for dancing.

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A ladies' powder room and a men's rest room are off the restaurant.

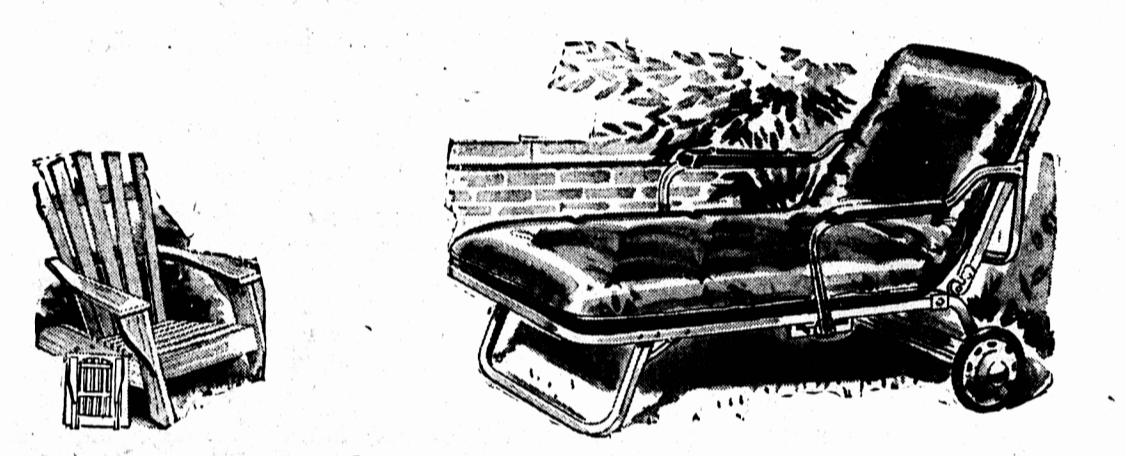
