Edmund Keating, Grosse Isle, Magdalen Islands, was in Charlottetown recently. He reports fishing very good this season, and says there were about 15,000 cases of lobsters, 12,000 pounds of cod and 1,000 lbs. of mackerel taken this season. Most of the lobsters, he said, were shipped to London, England. The remainder, handled by the Portland Packing Co., were sent to Maine. The codfish were shipped to Halifax and the mackerel to Boston. Herring, too, in large quantities were taken, largely used for home consumption, some sent to P. E. I.

After the closing exercises of New Glasgow School, which were held in the school room on Friday, June 28th, the pupils presented their teacher, Miss Vera M. Brown, with a beautiful gold bracelet accompanied by an address. The presentation was made by Miss Esther Stevenson, while the address, which conveyed sincere appreciation of the teacher's labors in the past two years, and best wishes for the future, was read by Miss Gladys Parkman. Ice cream and cake was also served by the pupils to all present. Miss Brown intends leaving about the first of August for Vancouver, B.C., where she will still continue in her chosen work.

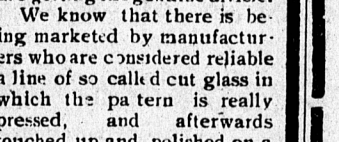

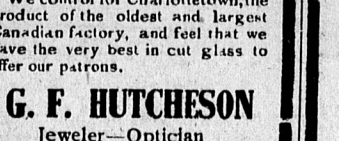
