THE MINTO.—The Minto, which left Pictou Thursday morning at 7 o'clock, docked in Georgetown yesterday morning at 10.05, bringing over 20 tons freight, 14 tons express, 35 sacks mail and 15 passengers, and after unloading her freight, express and passengers, which were brought to the city by the mail train, arriving here at 1.30 p. m., she left on return to Pictou on a special trip. The special train scheduled to leave the city at 7.30 last night left at 12.20 in the afternoon to connect with the Minto, remaining at Georgetown till the return of the Minto to that port.

THE EARL GREY.—The Earl Grey made an attempt to reach Charlottetown yesterday, leaving Pictou in the morning, and at latest reports received from the Marine Department was three miles off St. Peter's Island, outside Point Prim, where she was anchored for the night. It is not known whether she will make another try for the harbor to-day, but the opinion was expressed by some of the citizens last night that the steamer would probably round about and go to Georgetown as the ice in the harbor is very heavy and it will be hardly possible for her to break her way through to port. The large numbers who had gathered at the wharves, the Park Roadway and every available vantage ground, to witness the sight of a great ice-breaker ploughing her way through the ice, were keenly disappointed yesterday, but most of them will be looking forward for another try.
