TUESDAY. Young Daniel McGuire of Morell who was so seriously injured by a revolver recently was reported to be somewhat improved yesterday. He passed a much better day yesterday than he has since entering the hospital and was conscious for quite a time. He cannot speak yet.

The Guardian regrets to learn that Mrs. S. F. Tarbush's mother was obliged to be again removed to the P. E. I. Hospital for the third amputation. Two years ago the right foot was amputated, soon after the limb had to be amputated above the knee now the other foot must come off a terrible ordeal for a lady over seventy.

Frank Patch is the fastest performer of the season, obtaining a record of 2:14 at Woodstock, which also lowers the stallion record for the maritime provinces. Prior to this the fastest performer of the year, is 2:14 at Brocton, making him the fastest trotter ever bred in the maritime provinces. Helen Gould was the fastest pacing mare this season owned in the provinces, taking a record of 2:15 at Belfast, Me. L. Irving, owned in Danforth, Me., took a record of 2:16 at St. Stephen, which is the fastest mile on a provincial track by a new performer this season.

King Arion is the fastest trotter on provincial tracks this year, and he lowered the trotting stallion record to 2:17 at Fredericton, N. B. Baby Logan, with her record of 2:18, is the fastest new record trotter of the season in the maritime provinces. Great speed has been shown by the younger horses; Achille the Great is the first two year old to ever enter the list in the provinces, and among the other newcomers are: Baby Logan, 2:26 at 3 years; Mary Cromwell, 2:18, at 4 years, and P. K. 2:19, at 4 years. Dominion D. thus holds the fastest pacing record for 3-year-olds; Mary Cromwell the fastest pacing record for 4-year-olds, and P. K. the fastest province bred 4-year-old stallions.

At the conclusion of the preliminary hearing of Victor Hudson, St. John's, charged with manslaughter, held on Saturday the Magistrate bound him to appear before the next sitting of the Supreme Court to answer to any charge which might be laid against him. The session opened at 10.30 Mr. Stewart, for the defence calling two witnesses whose evidence follows:
