THE WEATHER THE TEMPERATURE TIDE, MOON, ETC.

THE WEATHER.—Yesterday was fair and warm, though cloudy and threatening at periods. The highest temperature recorded by the thermometer yesterday was 68 degrees above zero, the lowest registered the previous night being 49 degrees above. At 9 a. m. yesterday it was 51 degrees above; at 9 p. m. 57 degrees above.

SUDDEN DEATH OF PROF. KIRKPATRICK

Engineer of Car Ferry Terminals Died Under an Operation at Tormentine.

(Special to The Guardian) CAPE TORMENTINE, N. B., May 19.—Professor Kirkpatrick died here this afternoon while undergoing an operation for intestinal obstruction.

Guardian readers will learn of the above with deep regret. Professor Kirkpatrick, it will be remembered, was commissioned by the Dominion Government three years ago to locate the car ferry terminals in Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick.

(Canadian Press.) LONDON, May 19.—The first bill to become law under the Parliament Act is the Welsh Disestablishment Bill, which passed its third reading in the House of Commons tonight by a vote of 328-251.

PEACE CONFERENCE AT NIAGARA

(Canadian Press.) WASHINGTON, May 11.—With meditation proceedings removed to Niagara Falls activity here in the Mexican situation is noticeably lax today with the evident purpose on the part of the Washington Government to give the conference the amplest opportunity to work out its plans with the least possible influence from outside.

ARSENIC TABLETS KILLED LITTLE BOY

LIVERPOOL, N. S., May 18.—Frank McGregor, Wagner, the eighteen-month-old son of Frank Wagner, engineer of the Government steamer Lisgar, died yesterday as the result of swallowing arsenic tablets. For three hours after it was discovered the child had taken the tablets the doctors worked to save his life, but were unsuccessful.

ISLANDER RETURNS AFTER VISIT ABOARD

Mr. A. E. Dewar, of Newlands, Charlottetown, has returned from a visit to the Southern States of America extending over nearly five months. During a great part of the time he was in Washington, where he visited the Department of Agriculture, more particularly the fruit branch, and the great majority of the public institutions.

THE FIRST VOTE ON C.N.R. PROPOSALS

Government Resolution Carried with the Largest Majority on Record this Session, 111 to 64. Party Lines Broken. Bennett and Nickle, Conservatives, Voted with Opposition while William Charlton, Liberal, Voted with the Government.

Mr. Charlton Delivered Ringing Speech in Support of Government Policy. Thought too Much Time had been Lost in Coming to Assistance of C. N. R.

(From Our Own Reporter) OTTAWA, May 19.—The first vote on the C. N. R. proposals of the Government came at eleven o'clock to-night and resulted in the very large majority of 47, which is two higher than the normal majority and is the largest recorded this session.

The vote stood 111 to 64. Party lines were broken, Messrs. Bennett and Nickle voting for the MacDonald amendment calling for a six-months' hold, while William Charlton, of Norfolk, voted with the Government. When Mr. Bennett rose to record his vote in favor of the Liberal amendment he was loudly applauded by the Opposition as was also the member for Kingston. However, the Government benches squared said Mr. Charlton, "As Canada, ble matters when Mr. Charlton stood up in favor of the proposals."

Mr. J. A. M. Atkins, of Brandon, whose name had been similarly used, was paired with Mr. J. G. Turfiff, who is in the hospital in Montreal, but announced that had he voted he would have supported the Government. His announcement was received with Liberal cries of "oh, oh," and Government cheers.
