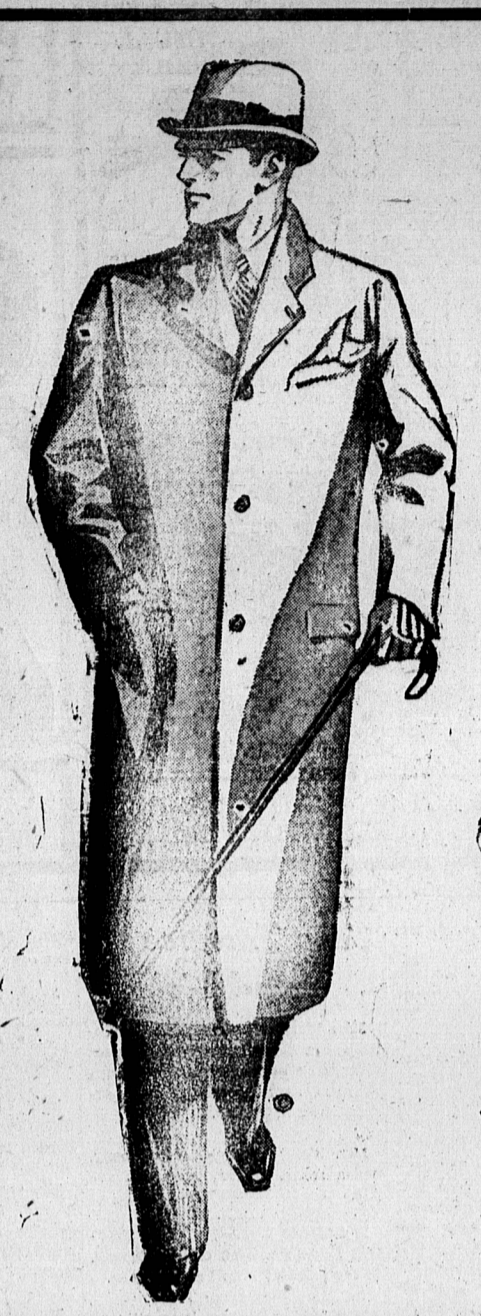

**Livestock Report**  
(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Que., March 25.—Cattle receipts 641.

Although there was a little of regular cattle, sales were draggy and prices easier. Packers were offering 975 for top steers. Odd choice light steers picked out were sold to butchers for \$10 to \$10.35 thin light ones sold down to \$7.50 and the

bulk of the medium kinds around \$9. Good cows sold from \$7.50 to \$8.00 and the bulk of the plain cows between \$6 and \$7.25 the poorest canners brought \$2.25 heifers were slow at \$6 to \$9. Bulls were not sold at time or writing.

Quotations: Butcher steers, good \$9.25 to \$10, medium \$8.75 to \$9.25, common, \$7.50 to \$8.75. Butcher heifers, good \$9.00 to \$9.50, medium \$8.00 to \$8.75, common \$6.00 to \$7.25. Butcher cows good \$7.50 to \$8.00, medium \$5.00 to \$7.25, canners \$3 to \$3.50, cutters \$3.75 to \$4.50.

Calf Receipts, 794.

Trading ruled slow, calves were of common quality. Mixed lots of fairly average quality brought \$11.50, there were no tops, and the common year-

lings sold for \$10 with the bulk of sales between \$10.50 and \$11, fall fed calves brought \$8, grass calves were easier at \$5.00 to \$6.00.

Quotations: Good veal, \$11.50, medium \$10.50 to \$11, common \$8 to \$10.50, grass \$5 to \$6.00.

Sheep receipts, 204.

Sheep sold for \$7.25 to \$8.00 with a few picked out at \$9, common to medium lambs \$10 to \$11.

Hog receipts, 2576.

Hogs were a shade easier selling between \$12.75 and \$13, fed and watered not graded. On one market, where only a few hogs were offered sales were made in lots of eight to ten hogs to local butchers for \$13.25 to \$13.50, sows were from \$9.50 to \$10.00.

TORONTO, March 22.—"It is moral and spiritual dynamite you are sending about the world," said Rev. Lynn H. Hough, Montreal, in paying tribute to the British and Foreign Bible Society at the all-Dominion meeting here. Messages of congratulation on the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the society were received from Viscount Willingdon, Premier King and others.

Rev. Eric Mason North, New York, general secretary of the Bible Society of the United States, said more than 11,000,000 copies of the Bible were issued in the United States in 1928.

Rev. H. D. Raymond, Charlottetown, P. E. I., spoke on behalf of Eastern Canada, where the first auxiliary of the Bible Society was formed.

ed. He referred to the countless thousands of immigrants pouring into Canada, who would have to be sent into the life of the country.

Sidney T. Smith, Winnipeg, president of the Canadian Bible Society, pointed out that all problems must be examined in the light of the word of God. "There never will be a new Bible nor is there need of one," he said.

Lieutenant-Governor W. D. Ross of Ontario, paid tribute to the 50th anniversary of the Bible. At the conclusion of his address, the Lieutenant-Governor was honored with a gift of a suitably engraved Bible.
