Return of Pollock To Passamaquoddy Brings Prosperity

WILSON'S BEACH N.B., Nov. 29 (G.P.)—Return of pollock to Passamaquoddy Bay has put new life into this large fishing village near President Roosevelt's summer home on Campobello Island.

Until recent years the Quoddy fishing grounds had teemed with pollock, a fine species of salt water fish. Then they disappeared, for some unknown reason, and many fishermen feared they would never return.

Wilson's Beach as usual is leading other coastal points as a producing and curing centre of dried pollock and other fish. The entire waterfront, stretching two miles, is covered with flakes of fish drying in the sun.

keep perfectly all winter and spring. Pollock, in preference to dried cod, is a staple article of the Quoddy fishermen's diet.

For many years the people of this island village depended almost entirely upon pollock, hake and haddock for a living, but later some successfully tried weir fishing.

The demand for slack-salted pollock in the New England states is increasing as word spreads regarding the plentiful supply.
