Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta, British Columbia, or in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

who are suffering great privations and hardships. Who will help to lighten their suffering? I append a statement made recently by eight prisoners recently returned to Canada because they are unfit for further service. It shows the misery and starvation they endure, and the appreciation of gifts of food.

PRIVATIONS ENDURED BY PRISONERS OF WAR IN GERMANY.

With one exception, in the case of Vernon Hughes, all were wounded and made prisoner in the second battle of Ypres. They have since that season-April, 1915—to quote their own expression, been "doing the Continent either in hospitals, or prison camps. Every one of the eight is able to go about freely, some with the aid of a stick, others with crutches, and seem in excellent spirits. But they make most bitter complaints about the supply and quality of food and against the medical treatment given in German prison camps.

STARVATION DIET THE RULE.

"We should have starved long ago," they said, "had it not been for parcels received from the Canadian Red Cross. When we asked for more the camp commandant would turn around and tell us, 'England is entirely responsible, because they refuse to allow supplies to come in.'"

children are starving as well." Describing more specifically the kind of food they received, two men who came from the Minden Camp said there was occasionally a variation in the menu, but their usual rations were: A cup of (so-called) coffee and a lump of brown bread for breakfast; horse beans and some vegetable mixture of sour potatoes and gravy—the latter made from a powder—for dinner, with a piece of horseflesh thrown in, once or twice a week, and in the evening they had raw herring and tea, and what was left of the bread served them in the morning.

Clarke, of Calgary, who was at Senelager, said they had only one meal a day for several weeks, and that consisted of rye bread and soup. Clarke had a leg taken off just below the knee. Both he and Hughes, whose hip was blown off, and who looks very poorly, complain very bitterly against the hospital treatment they received.

For days at a stretch, they said, they received no change of bandages or dressing of any kind. If they complained to the medical officer in charge they were promptly told there was no one to attend to them.

Every fit man, medically or otherwise, they observed, seemed to have been taken for duty at the front, while nursing is entrusted to inexperienced men, generally soldiers discharged from the army. Clarke still believes his leg was needlessly sacrificed.

STORM TOSSED SCHOONER ARRIVES IN CHARLOTTETOWN AFTER LONG VOYAGE

The three masted schooner Ruth Robinson, Boston now unloading 400 tons of salt for Carvell Bros. City had a very eventful trip since leaving Liverpool on June 25. While passing through the English Channel one of the German U-boats was sighted but she did not interfere with the schooner and soon disappeared. The first gale was encountered July first and trouble with the rudder head was discovered during the storm. Leaks were sprung and much care was required to cover and protect her cargo. More gales followed on July 25th and August 5th, and in the latter her mizzen top sail was carried away. One of the pump engines was disabled and because of the leaking and damaged rudder the vessel put into a Newfoundland port, arriving about the middle of August. After ten days delay, while parts of the vessel were being repaired and replaced she continued to Charlottetown still meeting with adverse winds and storms. The Ruth Robinson is one of the old timers built in 73 and has seen a good deal of service.

Captain Pye will go to Boston with Mrs. Pye who has been waiting in Charlottetown for the past four weeks. Captain Henry Atwood, also of Boston, will take command of the ship when she sails for Pugwash, N. S., where she will load lumber for Liverpool.
