LONDON, Nov. 9.—The special meeting of the Liberal Party called to consider party reorganization was held today with David Lloyd George presiding. Sir Robert Hutchison was appointed chief whip in succession to Sir Godfrey Collins, who was appointed by Lord Oxford and who opposed Mr. Lloyd George's election as leader of the party in the House of Commons. A feature of the meeting was that the whip was elected by the party as a whole instead of being chosen by the party leader as formerly. Notable absentees from the meeting were Sir John Simon, Walter Runciman and Sir Godfrey Collins.

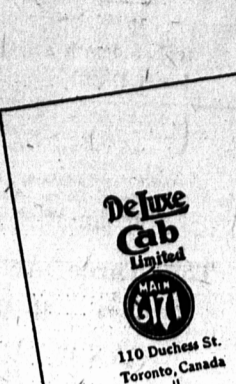
GIRL, 15, SWIMS 7 MILES IN SHARK-INFESTED SEA

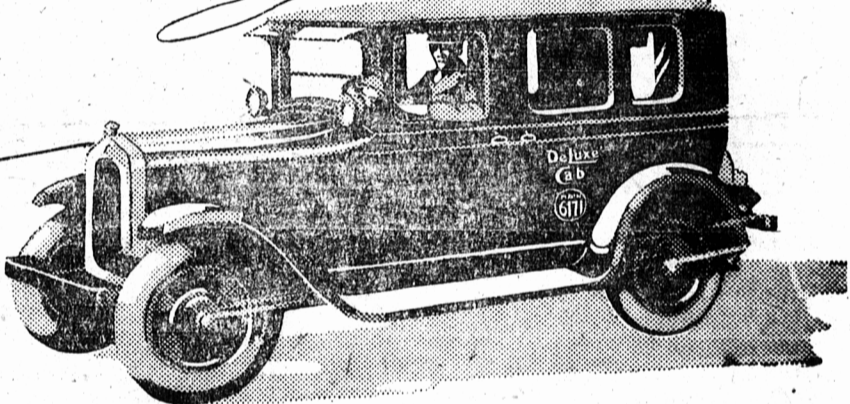

Tax Saving Plan Opposed at Capitol

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—President Coolidge and Secretary of the Treasury Mellon ironed out the tax refund proposal of the executive today and agreed that it should be accomplished through a credit to the taxpayer of about 12 1/2 per cent. on income taxes to be paid next year on this year's income. While the President was busy adjusting his tax saving plan with his secretary of the treasury, congressional leaders were expressing varying views which indicated clearly that the plan did not meet with full approval at the Capitol. Mr. Mellon made the proposal to take his surplus away from 1925

retirement, but he convinced the mediate refund of income taxes completely from an administrative standpoint that the idea for an im-
