THIRD AMONG NATIONS IN FOREST RESOURCES

Canada is Surpassed in Amount of Standing Timber only by Russia and the United States.

Next to her agricultural land, the great forests of Canada are perhaps the most valuable of her natural assets.

It has been estimated that Canada's forests cover an area of about two hundred and forty million acres and contain more than six hundred billion feet (board measure) of saw timber. This estimate, beyond calculation, of material suitable for pulpwood, firewood, poles, piles, posts, ships' spars and other timber too small for sawing into lumber.

This forest wealth is divided among the provinces of the Dominion as follows:—

British Columbia approximately fifty million acres containing four hundred billion feet.

Ontario, from eighty to ninety million acres containing about one hundred and fifty billion feet.

Quebec, about ninety million acres estimated to contain about one hundred and sixty billion feet.

New Brunswick, about twelve million acres with approximately twenty-two billion feet.

Nova Scotia, a little less than six million acres with ten billion feet.

Alberta, about five and a half million acres with between twenty and twenty-one billion feet.

Saskatchewan, approximately three and a half million acres containing about fourteen billion feet.

Manitoba, approximately two million acres containing about seven billion feet.

Prince Edward Island, forest area very small.

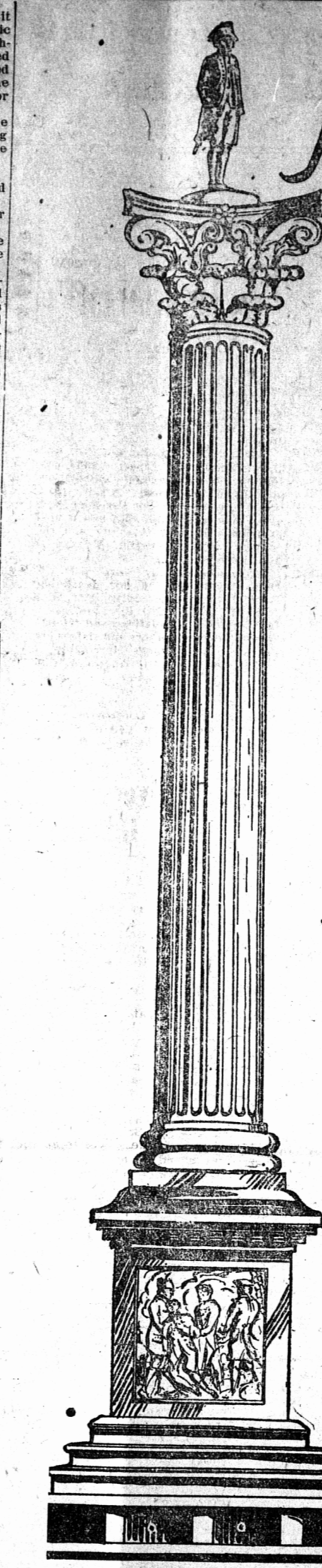
