REJECTED THE APPEAL

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 15—The Supreme Prize Court, which yesterday gave a final hearing in the case of the British steamship Oldhamia, captured by the Russians in the Russo-Japanese war and later re-captured by the Japanese, rejected the appeal of the Manchester and Salford Spring Company—the owners of the steamship—and the Standard Oil Company, the owners of the cargo, against the

decision of the Liban Prize Court. The latter court had already refused to entertain the demand made, by these two companies for compensation to the amount of \$500,000 for the loss of the steamship and her cargo. The Supreme Prize Court only allowed the Standard Oil Company the right to take legal steps to recover the cost of two hundred empty cases.

FRENCH SAILORS SAIL TO DEATH

ST. PIERRE, Dec. 15—Seven members of the crew of the French warship Admiral Aube, who started for the shore on Monday night, are missing. It is thought that all were drowned. The warship, which arrived two weeks ago, is anchored in the roads.

Last night seven of the crew were given orders to take a steam launch and remain ashore over night. When the launch was about half way into port the watchman lost sight of the boat. It was dark and a heavy snow-squall came from the southwest unexpectedly. It was learned yesterday that the men had not landed and it is feared that they were swamped by the squall and her occupants all lost.

YOUNG TURK SUCCESSFUL

CONSTANTINOPLE, December 15—The Young Turks have been successful in the local elections of deputies to the new Chamber. The ten representatives are made up of five Turks, two Armenians, two Greeks and one Jew.

REDUCTION IN SUGAR.

NEW YORK, Dec. 15—All grades of refined sugar, with the exception of "Confectioners A," were reduced five cents a hundred pounds yesterday.

REV. J. J. RICE DEAD.

TORONTO, Dec. 15—Rev. J. J. Rice, who was knocked down by a street car last Tuesday, died in the hospital yesterday afternoon.

\$50,000 LAWRENCE FIRE.

LAWRENCE, Mass., Dec. 15—For four hours last night the whole city department fought a stubborn fire which started in the basement of the Adams block at 286 and 288 Essex street, and working its way upward between the walls and by the central air shaft evidently destroyed the entire interior, leaving only a shell of walls standing. No other buildings were burned. The total loss is fifty thousand dollars, fairly covered by insurance.

ROOSEVELT MUST EXPECT TO KILL ELEPHANTS.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Dec. 15—It is stated here that for his African trip President Roosevelt has ordered from the Winchester Repeating Arms Company, four different types of rifles. The first of these rifles is known as the Model of 1895, of .405 calibre. This is the most powerful ever made and is intended for the very largest type of African game.

BOSTON BAKER SAYS HE CAN BEAT THEM ALL

DETROIT, Mich., Dec. 15—Paddy Dinnen, the "Boston Baker," who led the seventy-two hour grind men in the Light Guard Army, and bids fair to win first place, is out with a challenge to Dorando, Hayes or Longboat, now all professionals, to race the Marathon distance any time, any place, Dinnen, who has been in the racing and walking game for twelve years, ever since he did five winning miles at a picnic, thinks he has a chance to beat the Marathon wonders at their own game, and declares that he can find backers among Boston friends as far as \$1,000. "I'm going out after these men," declared Dinnen. "I'll race any time after I get through here."

On the sawdust covered track at the armory, sixteen laps to the mile, and short turns, Dinnen during the first day of the grind made twenty-five miles, almost the regulation record for the same day was set a record for such tracks. \$10,000 DAMAGES CAUSED BY WATER TANK BURSTING

ST. JOHN, Dec. 15—The I. C. R. water tank at Island yard, holding 100,000 gallons, or 5,000 tons of water, burst with a mighty roar the other night at 10 o'clock. Yesterday morning broken timbers and twisted steel bands marks the spot. The force of the escaping water from the tank broke the bridge across March Creek, also broke all windows in dynamo room and stores' department. An idea of the force of the explosion can be gained from the fact that pieces of the iron castings, weighing 300 pounds, were hurled 100 feet. Two men were knocked down by the flood of water but were uninjured. The damage, including the loss of the tank, is estimated at \$10,000. The explosion was due to the rotting of iron bands which held the tank.
