Vichy Claims Revolt Suppressed

LONDON, Nov. 15. (C P)—Vichy announced Saturday the suppression of a miniature revolt in Metropolitan France and professed bewilderment over the situation in French North Africa where the Americans are sharing governing and defence powers with Frenchmen of the Allied side, some of them recently out of Vichy. The abortive revolt was said to have been led by Gen. Atte De Tassigny, military commander of Montpellier and former commander in Morocco, who after hearing of the departure of Gen. Honoré Giraud to Africa on Nov. 8 abandoned his post and took with him several officers and men and two guns to form a dissident unit in France. The communiqué went on to say that the Vichy government had ordered the countryside under a curfew and measures taken to insure order, and that the revolt had been suppressed. He was accused of plotting to be chief of the general staff of French Rebel forces, and will be tried by a military court, the communiqué said. Why such a small incident should be made the subject of a formal communiqué was not clear, but Allied quarters thought it might have been broadcast for exemplary purposes dictated by the Germans.

Latest R.C.A.F. Casualty List

OTTAWA, Nov. 13. (CP)—The R.C.A.F. in its 420th casualty list of the war today reported one man killed on active service overseas, one missing after air operations overseas and two killed on active service in Canada. Ten men previously reported missing overseas were listed as now for official purposes presumed dead, one man was reported dangerously ill from injuries suffered on active service. Two men were listed as seriously injured on active service in Canada. The section listing casualties among Canadians serving overseas with the R.A.F. contained the names of two men killed on active service. CANADIAN ARMY LEARNS ABOUT ATTACK, DEFENCE IN EAST COAST "BATTLE"

With the Canadian Army on the Atlantic Coast, Nov. 17-18 an important area of eastern Nova Scotia has been "saved" from almost total destruction by an "enemy raiding force" after four days and nights of warfare in the most ambitious manoeuvres yet held in the Atlantic Command. Today, with the manoeuvres ended, thousands of tired, mud-grimed soldiers nursed aching muscles or revelled in the luxuries of hot showers and comfortable beds. But midnight oil burned lavishly as staff officers and unit commanders pored over and debated the almost countless lessons that had been learned in attack and counter-raid measures against the day when "it may happen here." Briefly the "four-day exercise" which was amphibious in nature, was built around a mock "enemy" landing on an eastern Cape Breton shore. To drive off this raiding force, troops from Debert Camp, in Central Nova Scotia, were called up and the action between the two groups formed the basis for the manoeuvres. Rapid-fire orders from Atlantic Command headquarters started troops on the move, including an army cooperation squadron of the R. C. A. F. brigade group, including artillery and other arms. The troops were to drive off the raiding force after a long night march, the Debert force arrived at Canso Strait and crossed without incident, but then came under heavy fire. From then on, for three days and nights it was a struggle, mile by mile, with the "enemy" fighting stubbornly and providing not a few surprises. Chief of staff for the "enemy" force was Lieut.-Col. G. Roach of Toronto, and formerly of St. Catharines, Ont. Lieut. G. Montour of Hagersville, Ont., Sgt. D. Cryden of Hantsville, Ont., Lieut. H. M. MacGibbon of Fredericton, Cpl. A. Carrey of Sudbury, Ont., and Cpl. J. Knight of North Sydney, N.S. The exercises were witnessed by Maj.-Gen. W. H. P. Elkins, C. B., E. D. S. O., general officer commanding-in-chief, Atlantic Command, and Maj.-Gen. P. E. Leclerc, M. M., E. D. general officer commanding 7th Division. Although sleeping in the open in November is far from a mid-summer holiday and manoeuvres at their best are tiring, the troops on the whole enjoyed the four-day show immensely. They knew they were learning to play for keeps and they took the bad with the good in their stride. One of the best lessons from the mock warfare was in the great opportunity given to practice administrative arrangements with regard to movement control and supplies, petrol and feeding of troops in the field. The troops also gained valuable experience in the co-operation of all arms, such as artillery, engineers and signals, with infantry. One of the highlights of the manoeuvres, and actually the climax was the dawn assault across a broad river which outflanked the enemy and put him to rout. This assault was a complete success, due largely to a decoy attack launched a mile further down the river, which drew off enemy patrols from the shore opposite the main attack's starting point. Collapsible reconnaissance boats were used to transport the men across the water. Each boat carried seven to eight men. Ten minutes after the main assault started scores of eager riflemen had been landed. The "enemy" had been caught flatfooted and it was all over but the shouting. The troops were too tired to do much of that.
