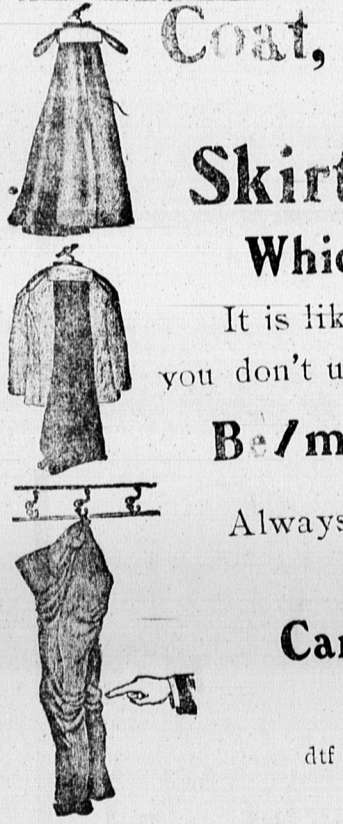

The latest news, first of all. Harold Ferguson from Calgary and Leonard Wood Edmonton, are visiting in Summerside.

The S. S. Stanley returned to Summerside, Saturday, about 2.30 p. m., from Pt. Du Chen.

The Stanley left Summerside at seven o'clock Saturday taking away 2,000 bags oats and one car pork.

The sum of \$120 was realized at the bazaar and tea held by the ladies of the W. C. T. U. in the Ludlow Hall Summerside on Thursday last.

The cargo of the Stanley, from Summerside on Saturday morning consisted of 2000 bags oats, 1 car dressed hogs, 1 car mixed freight and 2 horses shipped by John McDonald.

Miss Constance Burrows arrived at her home in Summerside yesterday to spend her Xmas holidays. Miss Burrows is a student at the Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown.

The Summerside fireman were called out Saturday afternoon, about three o'clock, to the residence of Frank McDonald, Convent Street. They responded promptly but their services were not needed. The cause of the alarm was a fire in the chimney, the smoke of which went through the house from a crack in the flue.

The steamer "Stanley" was supplied with fresh water by the firemen of Summerside on Friday night last. It required a stretch of nearly 2000 feet of hose to reach from the hydrant at the head of the wharf to the steamers tanks. After the work was finished the firemen were given a supper by orders of the chief at the Railway Dining Rooms.

The Pioneer announces that the death occurred on the 4th inst, at Spangere, Wash., of Duzal S. Hunt, formerly of this province. 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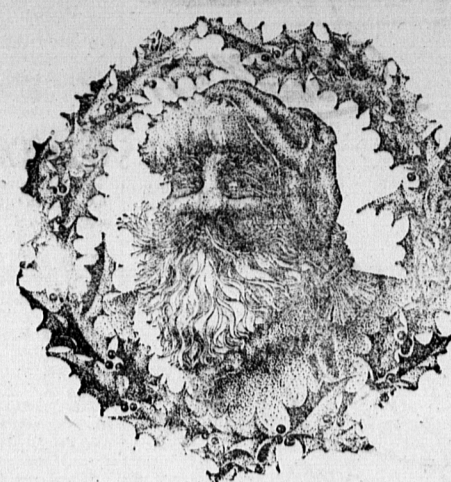
