STABILIZING INFLUENCE OF ORGANIZED LABOR
 MONTREAL, March 1.—(AP)—Speaking before members of the L.L. Pelletier Lodge No. 14 of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen gathered here for the celebration of the 50th anniversary of that organization at which the 85-year old founder L.L. Pelletier, now of Port William, Ont., was present, along with A. F. Whitney, of Cleveland, Ohio, president of the brotherhood, A.J. Hill, chief of personnel of the Canadian National Railways, referred to the stabilizing influence of a unit which had existed 50 years and on behalf of the railway management, thanked the trainmen for their co-operation. Without the co-operation of organized labor, he said, we would not go anywhere. We have to thank the employees for the fact that the National System is such an efficient, well-operated railway. In commenting upon the assistance given by co-operative groups, he said that the management had adopted suggestions given by the men at the rate of six a day for thirteen years.

 MONTREAL, March 1.—The stock market, price level slanted a bit higher today but minor spots gave the list a ragged appearance. buoyed by light buying toward the close, metals did better with nickel ahead more than a point to 51 1/8. Rails, aside from Steel Car's loss of 1-2 at 40, finished quietly steady.
 Inactive in recent sessions, papers dipped in quiet liquidation. Fractional declines showed for Howard Smith, St. Lawrence Paper, Preference and St. Lawrence Corp.
 General Steel Ware, bought steadily in early dealings, firmed 1-2 to 8 but small declines were notched by Dominion Steel B and Imperial Tobacco.

MONTREAL, March 1.—(CP)—Today's livestock receipts totalled 88 cattle, 574 calves, 32 sheep and lambs, 982 hogs.
 Cattle were steady. A few good steers made \$5.50 with common kinds down to \$4. Good cows sold up to \$4.50 with medium kinds from \$3.50 to \$4. Canners and culvers were from \$2 to \$2.75. Common bulls were \$3.25 to \$3.75.
 Calves were steady, quality considered. There were no tops. The bulk of the calves were sold in mixed lots between \$3.50 and \$4.00. Common light veals and drinker sold down to \$6. Grassers were from \$4 to \$4.50.
 Common lambs sold at \$7.25. Sheep were from \$3 to \$5.
 Hogs were higher. Several lots were delivered on former contracts. Fresh sales were at \$10.15 to \$10.25 for bacon, fed and watered. Selects drew \$1 per hog premium with the usual cuts on off grades. Sows were from \$7 to \$7.50. Hogs sold at the market on rail grade brought \$13.70.

Narrow Gains Registered On New York Mart

 NEW YORK, March 1.—A little buying was sufficient to turn the stock market tide today and it leaders fractions to 2 or more points at the best. Light profit selling in the final hour pared extreme advances in many cases.
 Gains and losses were equally divided among Canadian stocks.
 The Associated Press average of 60 issues retained a gain of 3 of a point at 45.8. Transfers amounted to 534,140 shares against 560,610 yesterday.
 Steels were out in front from the start. The automotive group was a close second, reflecting partly General Motors' January overseas sales which were the highest for the month on record.
 Omission of the Johns-Manville dividend because of "business uncertainty" put a dent in this stock. It opened 20 minutes late, off 1-2 points, but subsequently recovered to finish down 2 1-2 at 77.
