NORFOLK, Va., April 14—A heavy frost in the Norfolk county trucking belt recently did damage to strawberries, cucumbers and beans. All cucumbers above ground were cut off. In some sections of the country strawberries in full bloom were killed, almost completely thus ruining the crop.

AN INNOCENT BOMB

BRANTFORD, April 14—John Green an employee of McClay's stove works London, figures in a queer police case here last week. Having recently removed to London he came back to Brantford to claim his wife. Expecting trouble in securing her, he became violent and threatened to blow up a local house with the contents of a small vial which he held in his hand. His arrest followed, when it was found the instrument of violence was a bottle of perfume.

FORCED TO KILL HERSELF

ROCHESTER, N. Y., April 14—Coroner Alcindienst has received a letter signed "George Williams," saying that an unknown woman suicide fished out the Genesee River in a race a few days ago, was "Maudie A. Delleia of New York, who was once wealthy." The letter added that "she was compelled by the Black Hand to kill herself."

AN INSANE MAN'S FRENZY FATAL

AURORA, Ill., 14—John Anderson, a plumber, becoming violently insane recently armed himself with two pistols, a shot gun and three bombs and killed Mrs. John McVey, who narrowly missed slaying her husband, wounded Mrs. John Belford and then committed suicide, blowing his head off with a shot gun.

HE TERRORIZED WOMAN

ATTLEBORO, April 14—Peter Curtin, who gives his home as New Britain, Ct., was last week sent to the house of correction for six months. There was a train of women in the courtroom as witnesses, and it was stated that the man had terrorized the neighborhood near Orange street, carrying a big stick and scaring every woman in that section. The man has a long police record.

DEATH OF S. T. PRIDDLE

BARRIE, April 14—Probably the oldest man in the county of Simcoe, died here last week in the person of Stephen Thomas Priddle. His age was one hundred and three years. Born in Kent county, England, in 1803 he came to Canada, settling in Oro Oro township in 1849. For thirty years he lived in Muskoka, near Utopia. During the last four years he had lived in Utopia, nine miles west of Barrie, mostly alone. Three weeks ago, not being able to look after himself, he was brought to the hospital here, where he died. He was a total abstemious throughout his life, and his wife died ten years ago in her 75th year.

THE WRECK OF LAKE ERIE

DETROIT, April 14—Only additional bits of wreckage which washed ashore to-day bear mute evidence of the fate which befell the seven members of the crew and the three passengers of the fishing tug George A. Floss, which foundered in last Wednesday's storm. So far the waters of Lake Erie have refused to give up any of the bodies of the men, who were believed to have perished. Only small parts of the tug have been carried up the beach by the sea. The shore east of here was patrolled for nearly one hundred miles to-day, but the search was unavailing. The wives and children of the missing men are frantic with grief. Most of them have given up all hope. Mariners say it may be several days before the bodies of the men are washed ashore. Some believe the men were carried down with the boat and caught, so that their bodies may never be recovered. The exact scene of the disaster may never be known.

WIMPLE-FINGERED TYPISTS

PROVIDENCE, R. I., April 14—A typewriting contest, announced to be for the world's championship, ended a few days ago, the twelfth annual convention of the Eastern Commercial Teachers' Association. The championship was retained by Miss Rose L. Pratt of New York, whose average was 86 29-30 words a minute. L. H. Cumbs of New York finished second with 77 5-12. In the school championship typewriting contest, the winner was Miss Maude Linker, Springfield, Mass., with an average of 54.3. Miss Corinna Bourden of Toronto, Ont., was second with 54.2.

PHONED WITHOUT WIRES

PARIS, April 16—The remarkable wireless telephone experiments recently between Paris and Melun, distance of thirty miles, were a complete success. The radio telephone transmitting and receiving apparatus used was of an entirely new model, invented by Lieutenant Colin and Jeanne of the French navy. Lieut. Colin was stationed at the Eiffel tower, and Lieut. Jeanne, with M. Picard, Minister of Marine, at Melun. Newspaper representatives listened to the conversation at the premises of the Radio Telegraphic Manufacturing Company on Boulevard Grenelle. A headpiece fits completely over the head, shutting out all the noise of the outside world. One could hear with great distinctness the conversation between the Eiffel Tower, a few hundred yards away, and Melun, thirty miles distance.

CONSTRUCTION CAMPS

WINNIPEG, April 14—A charge of manslaughter is likely to be preferred against the foreman of the Northern Construction Company's camp at Kasabowia, as he is alleged to have caused the death of a man named George Saville by ordering him to leave the camp while sick and destitute. Information has been laid by two former employees of the camp, named G. McNab and G. Neith, who have engaged A. E. Cole as solicitor. Mr. Cole says the condition of affairs in many of the camps, as revealed by the stories of the men, indicate something worse than slavery.
