SHANGHAI, July 19.—(Special)—  
The revolt along the Yangtze-Kiang  
is spreading and there is fighting  
along the Tientsin-Tukow Railway.  
Proclamations are being circulated  
here setting forth that a punitive ex-  
pedition has been undertaken for the  
purpose of bringing President Yuan  
Shih-kai to justice for the murder of  
General Sung Chian-jen, Minister of  
Education, who was killed at Shang-  
hai last March, and for violating the  
constitution.

The Yangtze-Kiang towns are going  
over to the proposed Southern con-  
federacy and it is stated that Yuan  
Shih-kai has ordered a general ad-  
vance of his troops against them.

A Russian government bulletin re-  
cently issued states that Dr. C. G.  
Young's activities may result in es-  
tablishing an American competitive  
industry for the production of Per-  
sian "Lamb" and "astrakhan." Dr.

as delighted with the possibilities of  
producing the best quality of Karaku-  
le sheep here. He states that east-

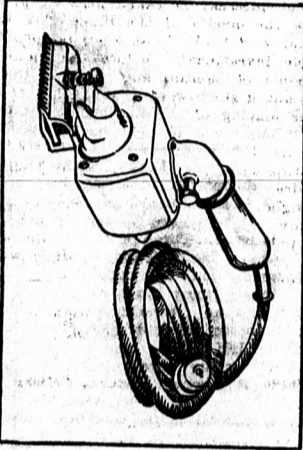

### ELECTRIC CLIPPER

For Horses, Not Men, and Does Its  
Work Easily and Swiftly

One of the latest of electrical ap-  
pliances is the electric horse clipper.  
The clipper has a long cord which  
is reinforced by a heavy string coil  
to keep it from twisting or breaking  
and no special wiring is necessary  
to use it. Just plug into a socket  
that has 110 volts and there you are.  
A thick handle affords a firm, com-  
fortable grip and as the jaws work

automatically all the user need do  
is guide the implement. The carbon  
brushes are accessible and easily re-  
placed, adjusted or cleaned. The  
housing is dirt and dust proof, which  
prolongs the life of the motor con-  
tained within. Incidentally, this hous-  
ing is of aluminum, which is strong  
enough for such a purpose, yet light  
enough to make easy handling. Fur-  
thermore, the motor is short and han-  
dy to clip the horse's feet.

### PLAYS FOR THE BLIND

Complete Edition of Shakespeare For  
Unfortunates in Darkness

Before very long those who are  
afflicted with blindness will be able to  
read the whole of Shakespeare's works  
in Braille.

"The blind," says Mr. Henry C.  
Prence, the travelling secretary of the  
British and Foreign Blind Association,  
"find a great solace in reading, and are  
especially fond of plays. Hitherto  
they have had about half a dozen of  
Shakespeare's plays at their disposal."

Blind people are poor, as a rule, and  
cannot afford to spend much on their  
literature. Each of these plays will be  
sold at about 15 cents, which will  
cover the cost of paper, embossing and  
publishing.

The cost of preparing the zinc plates  
from which the pages of "plays" and  
"dots" are embossed, will be about  
\$1,750 to be met by public subscrip-  
tions.

"People do not realize," Mr. Prence  
continued, "that there are over a mil-  
lion blind in the British Empire. There  
are 33,000 in the United Kingdom,  
150,000 in Egypt, and 650,000 in India."  
Nine plays have been finished, the  
last to be finished being "Midsummer  
Night's Dream." All the work is done  
by the blind at the association's head-  
quarters in London.

Mr. Prence, though totally blind him-  
self, is a man of remarkable versatility  
and optimism. Formerly a lecturer at  
King's College, London, he had to leave  
a good position at the India Office in  
1907, owing to falling sight. He played  
cricket at one time for Cheshire and  
Sussex. He is a lay reader in the  
diocese of London.

### Moonlight Makes Fish Bad

Strange powers have been always  
assigned to the moon, and it is not  
surprising to learn that a South Afri-  
can belle is that moonlight hastens  
the decomposition of fish. But it is  
surprising to find this belle brought  
forward as more than a superstition.  
D. E. Hutchins, of England, claims  
to have obtained experimental proof  
of this action of the moon, and sug-  
gests that it is due to some low form  
of life called forth or stimulated to  
action by moonlight.

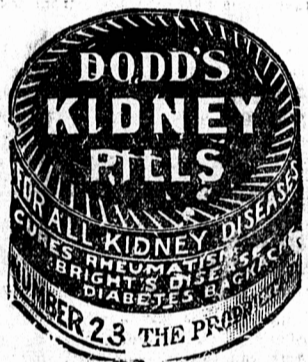
