Synopsis of Canadian North West Land Regulations. ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may, upon receipt of a questionnaire of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, (the applicant must appear in person before the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency in the district, before any application may be made) and if he meets certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, or by himself, be entitled to a homestead. Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the homestead for three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 20 acres, so long as he and his family are not dependent upon the homestead for their support. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$20.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry including the time required to earn homestead patent and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$20 per acre.
