GREENE NOTE TO TURKEY

LONDON, Aug. 26.—A Reuter despatch from Athens says: "The advent to power of the Venizelos cabinet has produced a remarkable reassuring effect as regards the attitude of the Entente Powers towards Greece. It is known that Premier Venizelos has received from representatives of the Entente Powers assurances of the utmost support possible under the circumstances."

"There is reason to believe one of the first questions which the new Government will have to deal with is that of the persecution of Greeks in Turkey. It is expected the Turkish minister will receive a communication on this subject within a week."

"Interpellations on the foreign policy are being prepared for Thursday's sitting of parliament, but M. Venizelos will avoid making a statement if possible, believing the moment inopportune."

LONDON, Aug. 26.—"A new big peace scheme" is being developed in Berlin the Amsterdam correspondent of the Daily Chronicle reported. The scheme is to be disclosed to the world if the German plans do not miscarry, the correspondent said.

"The correspondent asserts it will not this time take the form of mere feelers through the neutral press but will be a definite proposal for peace made to the allies, either directly or through some powerful channel, such as the Vatican."

PROVINCIAL CONVENTION OF THE I.S.S. ASSOCIATION

On Tuesday, Aug. 24th about 150 delegates from various points of P. E. I., invaded the beautiful little town of Montague, in the interest of the Interdenominational Sunday School work of the province. The President, Rev. J. C. Martin of Cardigan presided.

The first session was held in the Presbyterian Church. Rev. J. Sterling led the opening devotions. Rev. J. C. Martin gave the presidential address which was a manly appeal to the young manhood and the young womanhood of the province.

In a few well chosen words, Rev. F. A. Hubble welcomed the delegates. He said that the delegates were grateful for their hearty welcome and intended to enjoy themselves to the utmost, but their real purpose was to plan and work in the interests of the Kingdom of Christ, and they would address themselves closely to that work and hoped to bring a blessing upon the province.

(E) RECORDING SECRETARY:
Mr. John Alexander, M. A., Supt. of the Secondary Division, I. S. S. A., then spoke. He was born under the British flag, and has five brothers at the front. He said, in part, that we worry too much about the Bible, whereas we ought to worry, if we worry at all, about souls. Our limited intelligence will never understand the Book. If the level of our intelligence were the level of the Book it would be unworthy of our faith. But our object is to get boys and girls and men and women to know God as their Father, and we should use the Bible as a means to that end.

The Bible is a history of city building, from that city built by Cain to the New Jerusalem which John saw. Secular history is a further record of city building. Why did men thus build? To get a place of security. But that place, "the great golden city of the future," is described in Zechariah 14. "The streets of the city shall be full of boys and girls playing in the streets." This "golden city of the future" will never come until the boys and girls can play in the streets without danger of physical and moral contamination. They must play. It is not sinful to play, it is natural and necessary. What is their play? An imitation of their elders. And this imitative play is moulding the ethics of the next generation. Mr. Alexander then dwelt on the phases of the adolescent period both of boys and girls. The things which we laugh at in them are the realities of life. The developments of the well-known habits of girlhood are "the lure of the home," the unfolding of that character which makes the home.

Mr. H. C. Cross gave the "message from the word. Speaking from Matt. 4:23, C. Cross said that the ministry of Christ is threefold—teaching, preaching, healing.

His disciples were Christ's Sunday-school class. He went about the houses and villages teaching.

He knew His scholars and He knew His subject. This was the secret of His ready reply, to the doctors in the temple. He often taught by appeal to the Scriptures. The expression "Have ye not read," is of frequent occurrence. Moreover He spent years of preparation for His work.

His methods were—to find the point of contact with His pupils, to make free use of illustrations. His object was to secure practical results, that is, changed lives. He had perfect self-control and was not ruffled by opposition. Moreover He always made it clear that He was not about His own work but His Father's.

Rev. C. Robertson, B. D., Gen. Sec. of the Presbyterian S. S. Board spoke on the "Graded Lessons." He spoke on the value of grading the classes and grading the teaching but he emphasized the supreme importance of GRADING the LESSONS so as to adopt them to the respective ages of the scholars. We would not begin teaching the children of the eighth chapter of Romans, nor talk to big boys and girls about the baby Moses.

The minister should face the question of graded Lessons and decide what is best for his scholars. Then the superintendent must study the question so that everything connected with the worship shall be intelligible in every part singing, prayer, reading. But the question is one of special interest and obligation to the teacher, whose duty is to teach a Bible story plainly and intelligibly.

One church and school must decide what will be the best "steps" for its own work in this matter.

The address was followed by discussion.

Rev. W. A. Ross M. A., presented his sixth annual report as Field Secretary for the Maritime Provinces. The District Conventions had been of greater interest during the year than hitherto. The total average attendance at these conventions was 2500, an average of 75 at the afternoon sessions and 150 at the evening sessions. He deplored a lack of interest in the department in the schools which are closed during the winter. There is special need of developing local workers. It is local leadership that counts.

Mr. J. C. Jardine of Summerside presented the report of the Executive Committee. He mentioned that the present Provincial Convention was the third one held in Montague. The Executive had met four times during the year. The Executive had associated itself with the Boys' Conference held in Summerside in April, at which Mr. Taylor, St. Ann's was present as an expert on Boys' Work. Recently a meeting of representative boys from each district was held at Cardigan in charge of Mr. H. C. Cross.

The Executive had received the report of the Special Committee appointed to inquire into and report on the practicability of a special Field Sec. for this province. The report of this committee was not final. Appreciative reference was made to the "energetic, faithful and splendid" work of Rev. W. A. Ross as Field Secretary during the past five years.

Mr. Alexander gave an address on "Fundamental Principles." In brief he said that having boys and girls does not constitute fatherhood and motherhood. Some mothers treat their boys like girls and some fathers treat their girls like boys. He described the most awful disease in the world "adult mania," the madness of the adult who can never see anything except from his own standpoint, and expects boys and girls to look at things from the same standpoint. He deprecated punishing boys and girls for every fault. When parents have to resort to threats to control their children it is evidence that the child has outgrown the parents. Jesus Christ taught that devils are not cast out by beating but by "prayer and fasting." The speaker described the "gang" period of boyhood, when the lad, often in defiance of the parents will insist on companionship. But this tendency should not be suppressed; it is simply the natural development of the community life. Christianity is life, and boys must be taught how to live among others.

On Tuesday afternoon the Convention of Sunday School Workers was continued. Rev. Wm. McLeod of Dundas led the devotions. Then followed an address by Rev. J. C. Robertson on "The Need of Teacher Training." He spoke of the relation of seed to harvest and said that the harvest the Sunday School is working for is the most important in the world. Referring to the disciples rebuking the mothers who brought their children to Jesus, and Jesus' rebuke to the disciples, he said that he thought that we, with our emphasis upon the child, had not nearer to the mind of the Master than those disciples had. In a Teacher Training Class we should begin with the study of the child. Several books on the question were recommended as a reference library for every Sunday School. Dr. Coffin, from Trinidad, said that the Teacher Training Work in that mission is the most important of the missionary agencies.

Rev. Wm. McLeod of Dundas gave an address on "Sunday School Undertow." He said, in part, "Sabbath School Work constitutes a child's current, associated with childhood and more mature life and flowing underneath and giving rise to upper currents of untold good, thus forming a peerless stream flowing far and away beyond the community of its origin. Think of the fact that in North America there are 12,685 Sunday Schools; 1,439,739 officers and teachers and about 10,000,000 scholars. The average attendance is

9,934,400, and 1,055,000 from Sunday Schools entered the church as communicants during the year. The rate of 6,765 per Sabbath. . . . How well the truth that 30,000,000 in the 24 hours of the Sabbath Day study the same International Scripture lessons, and have hymns, prayers and other means of grace centering in the principal teachings of the Divine Word studied. . . . Many Christian folks find their best in some cases only chance for use of their talent and expression of love for Jesus in Sabbath School Work. Some members enthused secure others for the school and thus the undercurrent grows."

On Wednesday evening the meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. Rev. G. C. Henry conducted the opening devotions. Rev. J. C. Robertson spoke on "The Sunday School of the future." The Sunday School of the future will be the result of the forces which are at work today. Among these forces he mentioned:

Efficiency. This is essential in every department of work today. The farmer, the doctor, &c., must be efficient, and the church must also develop efficiency.

This is the age of the child. The present generation is the first which has adequately recognized the position of the child.

This is the age of education. Education acquiring a force which it never had before. The government is recognizing the value of education.

These three forces are at work among the people today and they are the forces which must permeate the Church and influence its work today.

Mr. Robertson thought the church had become "adultized," providing for the comfort of the adult rather than the child. He expected that this will be changed in the future.

Equipment, graded lessons are very important but the most important thing of all is the personality of the teacher who knows Jesus Christ. He represents Christ, and stands in the place of Christ, and must be careful not to misrepresent Christ.

It would be as unfair as ungrateful not to speak of the efficient services of the organist and choir who, each night of the convention, contributed so largely to the success and enjoyment of the meetings. Mr. J. L. Alexander next spoke on "Boys and girls as a community asset." Speaking of the glorious past, and the equally glorious future in store for Canada, the speaker paid a great tribute to the settlers and pioneers, who brought with them, among other things, strong religious conviction.

Continuing he said that the great problems of life are solved between the ages of fourteen and twenty, and supported the statement by several illustrations. And it is during the same period of life that the great religious problem is solved in the soul, and when more persons are converted than at any other age. And it is a serious reflection that this period al-
