Ripe tomatoes sold at 7 and 8 cents per lb., and celery per bunch, 5c. New potatoes per bush, whose sale price was from 45 to 55c. Hay per cwt. brought from 50 to 60c.

Co. No. 3 finished their firing on the 6th of August, but as they were getting into readiness for the 12 pounders a schooner came up and delayed operations for a half hour or more. By the time the range was clear the ever ready 12 pounders were rolled in and put an end to operations for the day. - St. John Sun.

The Cheese Board meeting held in the Board of Trade rooms yesterday was fairly well attended, and the following cheese was boarded: Red Point, 50; Lakeland, 90; St. Peter's, 80; Orwell, 150; East River, 65; Stanley Bridge, 210; New Glasgow, 275; Hazelbrook, 8; Union, 140; Cornwall, 100; Windsor, 50. The cattle market: Montreal dull, English market weak and declining, Brockville, 84 to 84 1/2. The highest bid was 8 cents and was only accepted by Orwell factory. Buyers present were R. E. Spillert, A. J. Blinn, E. Wheatley, W. H. Aitken and E. T. Higgins.

The adjourned cases against McMillan, Francis Mahar and Mary Bell, for keeping a dirty yard, were dismissed at the Police Court yesterday they having in the meantime cleared up their premises. John Woods and Alfred Downing, aged 8 and 12 years respectively, who recently received the whipping for running away with Mrs. Bell's team, appeared for taking a train or Mrs. Allen McPhee's, North River, from in front of Paton's store which they left on St. Peter's road. After a severe reprimand they were kept in the lockup until noon when they were liberated.

There will be a game of cricket played at Victoria Park this afternoon between the local nine ball team and an eleven from the Phoenix Cricket Club. The base ball team are doing this to give the cricket club some practice before going up against the Antigonish team which will come here the first week in September. All cricketers should take advantage of this practice and to get the grounds at 2 o'clock, sharp.

The stuffing box of the shaft of the S. S. City of London got loose on trip up East River yesterday afternoon just below McNally's Island. The Captain proceeded in a small boat to Webster's Corner and telephoned for a tug. As no tug was available Hon. Mr. Cumiskey authorized the Hillsboro to convey the passengers and cargo of the London to Hickey's wharf. From there passengers for Haggarty's and Hayden's wharves were taken in carriages. The Hillsboro then took the City of London in tow and arrived at Charlottetown at 10.00 p.m. Carriages were furnished to passengers to Haggarty's and Hayden's wharves free of charge and a free lunch was served to Charlottetown passengers. Vocal and instrumental music was indulged in on board the City of London. Repairs will be made as quickly as possible. In the meantime the routes of the London will be maintained by some other steamer.

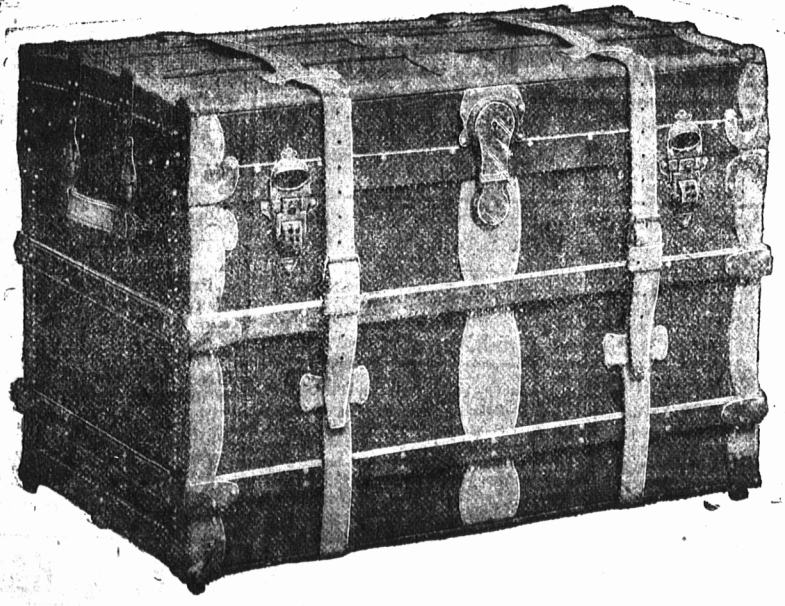
