Finance stated that there is still a balance of \$754,821 available for payment out of the sum provided for the purpose. In addition to the above, 23,277 depositors who had accounts of less than \$500 have received relief. The number of depositors with accounts of more than \$500 who have received relief to date total 2,984, and the aggregate paid to depositors of both classes is \$2,227,203 up to May 31, of this year.

MacDonald and Thomas Branded As Traitors

MOSCOW, June 9. —Ramsay MacDonald and J. H. Thomas are branded as traitors to labor's cause in a letter published by the Soviet Labor Federation and addressed to "The International Proletariat."

Calling for worldwide labor unity, the letter reads in part: "We think it is our duty to tell the International Proletariat that the defeat of the British (general) strike resulted from the traitorous tactics pursued by the Black Friday Heroes—the Right leaders of the Labor Party and General Trades Union Council, J. B. Thomas and Ramsay MacDonald, as well as Albert Purcell and the Left Wing. They are still responsible for the defeat, because despite their great influence with the general council, they trailed in the footsteps of the capitalists and surrendered."

This community was greatly saddened in the sudden passing of Mrs. Ramsay, beloved wife of Mr. Norman MacLeod Ramsay, of Hamilton, whose death occurred at the Prince County Hospital on Friday afternoon, June 10th. Mrs. Ramsay had not been well for a week, but her illness had not been known or thought of as being of a serious nature, and her passing at the comparatively early age of fifty-nine, shock to her many friends, and especially to the members of her home. Previous to her marriage, thirty-seven years ago, she was Miss Margaret Simpson, daughter of the late Mr. William McNeill Simpson, Hamilton, well known throughout this province as a leader in temperance and other reforms. Mrs. Ramsay was therefore connected with her native place during her whole life, and was always associated with everything aimed at the advancement of the church and community life. Whilst a member of the church, she was a consistent and faithful member, yet her memory will be most fragrant in the home, where she assumed the duties of wifehood and motherhood with true courage and with a more than ordinary capable manner. Mrs. Ramsay leaves to mourn, her husband, Mr. Norman MacLeod Ramsay, two daughters, Mrs. Walton Toombs of North Wiltshire, and Miss Sophie at home; three sons, Mr. Frank of Clifton; Mr. Everett of Hamilton, and Mr. Leslie at home; also an aged mother, Mrs. Simpson, to whom a special share of loving sympathy is extended; two sisters, Miss Tillie Simpson, Kensington, and Mrs. Elmer Taylor, Malpeque; and four brothers, Mr. Albert Simpson, Charlottetown; Mr. Andrew Simpson, Vancouver; Messrs. Frank and John of Hamilton. The funeral service was held in the home, and was one of the largest ever held in this community, about five hundred being present. The service was conducted by the pastor, Rev. A. N. Gillis, and the address was one of unusual beauty, and was interwoven with a thread of real sympathy. The text was from the words, Psalm 35-14, "I bowed down heavily as one that mourneth for his mother." The floral contributions were very many and very beautiful. The pall-bearers were: Messrs. George E. Brown, Margaret, J. A. Clark, Charlottetown; Fulton Simpson, Belmont; Howard Ramsay, Hamilton; Major Townsend, Sherbrooke; Villers Carr, St. Eleanor's. The remains were laid to rest in the cemetery adjoining Malpeque church.

The announcement made on Sunday morning relative to the acceptance of the call from Truro United Church to Rev. A. N. Gillis, pastor of Princetown church, was received by his congregation with feelings of very deep regret. This is the third call Mr. Gillis has received during the year, and it is an unmistakably a call to larger service in the church. Mr. Gillis will not leave Malpeque till early in September, and it is a recognized fact that it will be a difficult task to fill the place of a minister so highly esteemed and so wonderfully efficient.

Mahur presided, and a lengthy and varied program was well carried out. Mrs. Russell McKay was the accompanist for the evening. 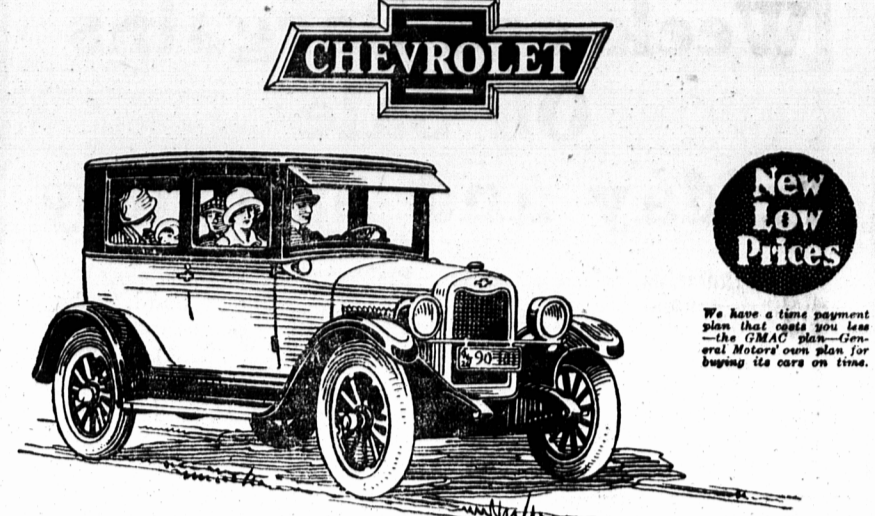
