Lea Government Should Now Resign

Desire Of Electors Emphatically Shown In Refusal To Grant Premier's Request For Legal Assistance, Says Conservative Leader.

TELEPHONE CABLE UNDER THE ATLANTIC

Will Be Laid From Newfoundland To Ireland.

PASADENA, Calif., Oct. 21—Dr. Frank B. Hewitt, President of the Bell Telephone Laboratories, yesterday said plans were being made to lay a telephone cable under the Atlantic from Newfoundland to Ireland. Dr. Hewitt said although reports of telephoning across the ocean by radio attracted wide attention, the present necessity for elaborate radio hook-ups made trans-Atlantic telephony "rather unreliable." The cable was planned to remedy this situation and bring about instantaneous personal communication across the ocean.

Interviewed last night on the result of the Conservative victory in the Second District of Prince, Hon. J. D. Stewart, K.C., leader of the Conservative party in the Province, stated that in view of the exceptional issue raised by the leader of the Government and the decision of the electors with respect to this issue, it was now incumbent upon the administration immediately to resign.

The people have refused to accede to his request and, by so doing, have in the plainest terms signified their desire that the present Government should immediately resign. And this notice comes from a District that has been strongly Liberal ever since Confederation!"

Ontario Premier Speaks at Opening Of New Building

LONDON, Oct. 21—The magnificent new Ontario building, headquarters of the Canadian province's activity in Great Britain, was formally opened today by Premier G. Howard Ferguson. He paid tribute to the capabilities of W. C. Noxon, Agent General for Ontario in London for the past ten years, and declared the splendid new building was largely Mr. Noxon's conception.
Premier R. B. Bennett of Canada, was also expected to speak at the opening, but was confined to his room by a slight indisposition.

"I might say that Ontario's position and opportunities are only typical of the whole of Canada," Premier Ferguson remarked, after an outline of the possibilities the provinces offered in every phase of activity. "Our great desire is that more people of the British Isles should share the great constructive program that lies ahead of us; that more of our capital should find its way to Ontario; that more of our kith and kin should join in the great work of Empire expansion to which we are striving to contribute substantially. It was with this motive the Ontario Government, conscious of the views of our people, decided to establish in the heart of the Empire, closer contact through an agency more in keeping with the dignity and importance of our province. This new building is a tangible evidence of our abiding faith in the future of the Empire, of our determination to become interwoven in its very fabric and life. Our earnest effort is to show that in other parts of the Empire there are resources and opportunities which, if taken advantage of, can greatly relieve the heavy burdens you are now carrying, and will guarantee the leadership of the Empire and the supremacy of her influence among the nations of the world."

UNSEASONABLE STORMS PLAY MUCH HAVOC

States of New York And Illinois Fight Late October Blizzards And Snow Drifts..

BUFFALO, N. Y., Oct. 21—Buffalo tonight faced an acute milk shortage. The city is cut off from its sources of supply by the blizzard which smashed its way across western New York during the week end, leaving shattered communications and blocked highways in its wake. More than 8,000 gallons of milk were withdrawn from the city's supply today and remained in trucks stranded on highways piled high with snow-drifts. City milk dealers, according to Harry W. Hutt, President of the Milk Dealers Association, encountered serious difficulties in supplying their customers, even in reduced quantities. Some relief was expected tomorrow.

Late this afternoon the lake shore road between Buffalo and Irving was opened to one way traffic, to allow hundreds of stranded tourists to reach Buffalo. Crews of workmen from the state and county highway departments and the bus companies were struggling desperately to open the rest of the highway to traffic. Winter's advance guard, an unseasonable storm that swept out of Canada and across most of the United States, was most severe today in widely separated sections, the far east and the south west. Storms centred in New York, where communications were disrupted by the heaviest October snowfall in many years.

Ten Thousand Bought Stock In Bob's Company

NEW YORK, N. Y., Oct. 21—Watson, Washburn, Deputy Attorney General in charge of the Bureau of Securities of the Attorney-General's office, announced today that at least ten thousand investors in Canada and the United States had bought stock of the Metal and Mining Shares Inc. of which Charles V. Bob, shipping financier was chairman. It had previously been understood that investment in the Bob concerns now under investigation was confined chiefly to a scattering of Bob's wealthy friends. Bob and his "right hand man," Frederick J. Russell, and his personal pilot, Col. Dean Lamb, all disappeared at Chicago on Oct. 5. The Bob plane was found in a hangar there.

No Commercial Fish In The Hudson Bay

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 21—There are no commercial fish in Hudson Bay. This is the finding of the Hudson Bay fisheries expedition sent out by the Dominion Department of Fisheries last July, which returned a month ago. In 22 days of actual fishing operations, using trawls, nets and lines, not a single commercial fish was taken by the expedition. The preliminary report of H. B. Hachey, officer in charge of the expedition, was made public today by Hon. E. N. Rhodes, Minister of Fisheries and puts an end to widely entertained hopes for the development of a large fishing industry in the Hudson Bay.

FOUGHT DUEL THE IMPERIAL TO DEATH CONFERENCE

Barber and Shoemaker Used Implements of Their Trade.

ALTO CEDRO, Cuba, Oct. 22—A barber and a shoemaker, using implements of their respective trades, fought a duel to the death here today. Joaquin Botsch, the barber, and Manuel Lopez, the shoemaker, decided to settle a dispute with razor and sputter for their unique duel. Fifteen minutes later Lopez was dead. Botsch was arrested for murder.

Narcotic Plants To Supply Illicit Demand In U. S.

GENEVA, Oct. 22—A report by the Austrian Federal Police to the League of Nations yesterday said that all the big European narcotic factories at present appeared to be working to supply the illicit narcotic traffic in the United States. Their report was based on an extensive inquiry in European countries, manufacturing narcotics. The Austrians were principally interested in discovering what was becoming of the opium products now being manufactured in Europe. Summarizing the findings, the report concludes "that there is no denying one fact, and that is that the illicit traffic in narcotics puts the regular traffic in the shade."

Diamond Thief Gets Big Loot

TORONTO, Oct. 21—Some smart diamond thief is alleged to have stolen \$8,000 worth of diamond jewelry from the room of Mr. and Mrs. Laurence C. Witten of Cincinnati while they were guests and occupying a room in a downtown hotel during the night of Sept. 26 and 27, it became known today. In a reward of \$1,000 advertised in the Toronto papers, Mr. Witten disclosed the fact that during the night of Sept. 26-27, while the undersigned and his wife were guests and occupying a room in a hotel in Toronto, certain jewelry was stolen, lost or otherwise removed from their possession. Mr. Witten's reward stands until December 31 this year and will be paid to anyone who effects the return or furnishes information leading to the recovery of the jewelry. Conservative Candidate Receives 215 Majority

Crushing Defeat For Lea Government In Second Prince By-Election Yesterday. Voice Of The People Overwhelmingly Condemns Administration In First Opportunity Presented Since 1927 Election.

THE LONG UNBROKEN RECORD OF LIBERAL VICTORIES IN THE SECOND DISTRICT OF PRINCE WAS SMASHED YESTERDAY WHEN MR. G. SHELTON SHARP, CONSERVATIVE CANDIDATE, CARRIED HIS PARTY COLORS TO A TRIUMPHANT VICTORY, SCORING A MAJORITY OF 215 VOTES OVER HIS LIBERAL OPPONENT, HON. THANE A. CAMPBELL, RECENTLY APPOINTED ATTORNEY GENERAL IN THE LEA GOVERNMENT. THE DISTRICT, WHICH AT THE LAST PROVINCIAL ELECTION RETURNED HON. MR. SAUNDERS BY A MAJORITY OF 366 VOTES, YESTERDAY REGISTERED, IN THE STRONGEST MANNER, ITS PROTEST AGAINST THE PRESENT ADMINISTRATION.

Conservatives throughout the Province are hailing Mr. Sharp's election as a decisive defeat of the Government, the Second District of Prince having been a Liberal stronghold since Confederation. In one election the constituency returned the only members of that party to the Legislature. It was here that the late Senator Yeo, a large vessel owner in the old shipbuilding days, and the late Hon. John W. Richards, were sent to the provincial House for many years in succession. This is the third provincial contest in which Mr. Sharp has run for the district. Mr. Campbell, who was trying his political wings for the first time, had strong backing from the Liberal machine and party press, and a determined effort was made to secure his election. He had been sworn in some months before his nomination, as Attorney General and member of the Executive Council.

Whacking Record Is Claimed
LONDON, Oct. 22—A record for non-stop whacking has been established by the Indian head master of a school at Mercaba, in South India, a Bombay despatch to the Daily Mail said today. In one morning the school master caned 183 boys who had quit their work and gone on a strike. Reaching their homes the boys complained to their parents, but most of their fathers and mothers gave them a second whacking. Two of the boys went to hospitals desiring to be treated but the surgeon gave them another caning, it was alleged, and sent them away. No more schoolboy strikes are expected at Mercaba, it is naively added.

Voiced Threats

MOSCOW, Oct. 21—The newspapers Investia and Pravda in leading editorials today voiced threats of economic retaliation by the Soviet Government against countries which may pass laws prohibiting import of cheap Russian goods. Editorials are inspired by decision of the Council of Peoples' Commissioners to reduce to a minimum, purchases in any country which "places obstructions to Soviet imports."
