PROGRESS OF THE WAR.

Doubt is expressed in various quarters as to whether there is a real intention to send the Baltic fleet to the scene of war. The Toronto Globe's military expert says that to send the ships to the east "would be an act of inconceivable folly." The Globe finds there are five good battleships in the fleet and two good cruisers, but the balance is "plain junk." If the Baltic fleet reaches eastern waters after Fort Arthur falls the same authority declares its fate is sealed. It seems not yet certain whether the fleet will proceed by way of the Mediterranean and Suez Canal or round Cape Good Hope, but the ordinary reader would suppose that the canal route would certainly be adopted. In any case the Russian ships proceeding eastward will be tolerably safe against attack during the first five or six weeks of their voyage, as there are no hostile ships this side of the Yellow Sea. Should Port Arthur fall in the meantime and it be found useless to proceed the Baltic fleet could be recalled at almost any point on its long journey. There will be many difficulties to be encountered, one of them being the frequent cooling of the smaller craft, while the battleships and cruisers will probably find it necessary to refill their bunkers in the Mediterranean or Red Sea and again before they reach their destination. To arrive in the Yellow Sea or the Sea of Japan shore of coal would be to invite disaster. As to Port Arthur the large plan shows on another page of this issue serves to give the impression that the besiegers have yet a hard and it may be a tedious task before them. The inner line of the stronghold's defences is yet practically unbroken, the one exception being Elze fort shown at the middle right of the illustration which was captured by the Japanese some two weeks ago, but which they were unable to hold as it commanded by other Russian forts. It has since remained unoccupied by either of the belligerent forces. A source of weakness has developed in the defence from the partial exhaustion of ammunition. The defenders are said to be using a poor variety of black powder made within the city, while the shells of the Japanese proved to be old Chinese in composition. It is said the Russian projectiles fared disastrously. Under such conditions the Russians are being forced to yield.
