HERE FROM BARBADOS.—Mr. and Mrs. C. Lomer Miles and Miss Miles arrived on Saturday from St. John, N. B., having landed on Saturday morning from Barbados, where Mr. Miles is manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce. It is their intention to spend their vacation at Holland Cove to which they went yesterday. Mr. Miles reports Barbados is not nearly as badly hit by depression as some other parts of the world. Under the fiscal arrangements with the Mother Country Imperial grown sugar has a preference in the British market, and this has considerably benefited the sugar planters of Barbados. The increase in trade between Canada and Barbados has been very considerable, and recently the tourist traffic has increased two to three hundred per cent. The West Indies are the natural complement of Canada, and year by year the relationships between them are growing closer and closer. 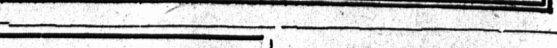
For the twelve months ending May the favorable balance was \$32,891,198 as compared with an unfavorable balance of \$77,737,551 for the previous twelve months.

The favorable balance with the United Kingdom for the twelve months was \$69,646,480 as compared with \$75,038,555.

The unfavorable balance with the United States of \$213,859,308 for the twelve months ended May 1931 has been lowered to \$96,737,978 during the twelve months period just ended.

Farm Notes

WEEDS SPOIL SEED CROPS

The present is opportune for sowing the clover and grass fields to decide whether they are suitable to be left for seed or should be cut for hay, observes the Dominion Seed Commissioner.

The prospect of an abundance or a shortage of hay is often an important consideration in deciding whether or not fields should be left for seed, but other factors should be considered in estimating the probable value of a seed crop. The ultimate price of the seed is of vital importance, but individual growers have little if any control over market conditions and must accept the element of speculation as to market prices as well as to actual yield per acre. The matter of quality, however, is the one factor of outstanding importance since, apart from market conditions, price depends almost entirely upon quality, and fortunately this is a matter which the seed grower has very much in his own control. This control is possible because the purity of a seed crop, its seed from weed seeds is principally the result of the care exercised in handling the seed crop.

Clover and grass crops intended for seed should be gone over carefully and an estimate made of the injurious weeds present. If these are too numerous to be pulled out or otherwise got rid of before going to seed, the crop should be cut for hay as the earlier cutting for hay will prevent many weeds from seeding and a hay crop of even average quality is to be preferred to a seed crop, however plentiful, which is polluted with weed seeds. Red clover and alfalfa for seed from second cut should be cut for hay ordinarily by July 1st.

Rotting or hand pulling, before they have gone to seed, is the most effective method of ridding a seed field of bad weeds and of making sure of securing a clean seed crop. Among the most injurious weeds, and the most troublesome weed seeds in clovers, are bladder campion, catchfly, couch grass and rib grass and ragweed, while in timothy, oxeye daisy and perennial sow thistle, both primary noxious in character, are most difficult to clean out of the seed.

Seed growers should police their fields carefully and be prepared to resort to liberal roguing, where necessary, in order to insure that their seed crop will be free of these impurities which too often have rendered otherwise good seed of no market value whatever.

WEEDS KILL SEED MARKET

In the last few years the market for Canadian alfalfa seed has been decidedly off. This has been due, in large measure, to a high tariff, amounting virtually to an embargo, in the United States, which country used to be our best customer for alfalfa. Another reason, and perhaps an equally important one is brought to attention by the Dominion Seed Branch; and that is that much of our alfalfa seed has come to be of inferior quality owing to infestation with weed seeds, and only seed of high purity and general high quality may expect to command a ready market. WINNIPEG, July 4.—(By the Canadian Press)—After shooting his wife with a sawed-off shot gun last night, John W. Terrill, 44, defied police attempts to enter his house and took his own life when tear gas bombs were used in an attempt to bring him to submission. Terrill, a telegraph operator, died instantly and Mrs. Terrill, 39 years old, died in hospital an hour later. The double tragedy came as the climax of long quarrelling between husband and wife and happened when the couple's two small daughters were at the home of friends.

that weedy fields ought not be cut for seed and every field intended for seed should be examined for weeds before cutting. If weeds are not too numerous the more troublesome ones should be removed by pulling before going to seed.

A casual examination will indicate whether or not the field is worth being kept for seed. All bladder campion and catchfly should be rogued from the seed crop as seeds of these kinds are very difficult to separate from alfalfa, and campion particularly is extremely hard to eradicate when once established in the land. Black medick is a common impurity in alfalfa and as it is impossible to rogue this weed out of a crop, fields having more than a limited quantity of this weed would not produce profitable seed crops.

Even a little roguing or pulling out of the worst weeds may greatly enhance the value of the resulting seed crop, and mean all the difference between profit and loss.
