**MOLASSES STILL SOARS.**—  
Molasses, the precious juice of the  
sugar cane, with which the mer-  
cury, even in these warm, bright  
sunshiny days, has been unable to  
keep pace, is still soaring. It be-  
gins to look as if it would be \$2  
molasses at retail before very long.  
Yesterday the wholesale price for  
the best grade here reached \$1.80 a  
gallon, the range varying from  
\$1.55 to the former quotation. Once  
molasses sold in New Brunswick  
for thirty-five cents and forty cents  
a gallon, but that was long ago,  
somewhere during the days when  
wheat was thirty-five cents a bushel  
in the Chicago market. Sugar here  
is worth \$19.10 at \$19.15 per hun-  
dred pounds for granulated. Sugar  
is considerably higher than this in  
the United States; and it is said  
speculators "have" bought large  
quantities on this side of the bor-  
der and have taken it across the  
line.—St. John Telegraph, 21st.

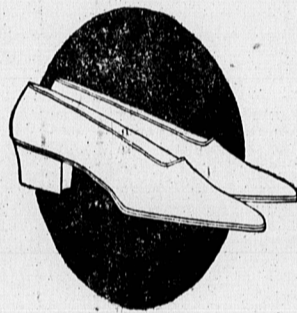
